Summary of Dr. Oosterwal's October 12, 2010 Presentation on Diversity

Dr. Oosterwal's presentation was taken from the perspective of someone who has practiced in healthcare in several places around the world for many years. Consequentially, he was able to offer deep insights and understanding into various cultures and their cultural codes. He clearly showed the consequences that can happen when people do not understand the different cultural codes and how miscommunication between healthcare professionals can be quite profound. Most cultural codes are rooted in various religions and cultures so it behooves us to make ourselves aware in order to empathize with patients. His points on the consequences and ramifications of what happens all the time in healthcare if this level of understanding is not practiced was an eye opener for many in attendance.
