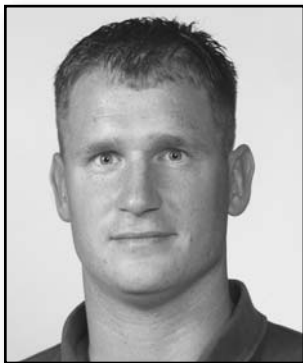


BULLDOG COACHING STAFF



CORY ANDERSON

Assistant Coach ♦ Tenth Season
Ferris State, 1999



Former Ferris State men's basketball player Cory Anderson is in his tenth season as a full-time assistant men's basketball coach at FSU after being retained upon the arrival of current head coach Bill Sall.

The 33-year old Anderson is the 18th assistant coach in Ferris State basketball history and the fourth FSU graduate to later serve as an assistant coach in the Bulldog program.

Prior to becoming a full-time assistant, Anderson served as a student assistant during the 1998-99 campaign. He is the older brother of former FSU center Adam Anderson (1998-03).

As an assistant coach, Anderson is instrumental in all phases of the program. He assists in the day-to-day operations and is also involved with the coaching, recruiting and administrative aspects. Anderson also directs and organizes FSU's camp program.

A two-year (1996-98) letterwinner for the Bulldogs, Anderson served as a senior tri-captain during the 1997-98 campaign. In 1997-98, he helped lead FSU to its first-ever GLIAC Tournament title, an

appearance in the NCAA Tournament and the school's first 20-win season in nine years. He averaged 6.2 points and 4.4 rebounds per game while starting all 33 contests.

During his two-year career at Ferris State, Anderson started 47 consecutive games and tallied 343 points and 248 rebounds. He totaled 10.0 points and 5.7 rebounds per contest as a junior.

Prior to joining FSU, Anderson spent two seasons (1994-96) at NCAA Division III power Calvin College where he averaged 6.8 points and 5.1 rebounds per game. He was originally recruited to play for the Knights by Sall, who at the time was an assistant coach at Calvin.

A 1994 graduate of Kent City High School, Anderson was a two-time all-state selection in basketball and football. The 6-5 prep standout also garnered All-Newaygo County Athletic Association honors three times each in both sports.

The son of John and Sally Anderson of Kent City, Mich., Anderson graduated from Ferris State with a bachelor's degree in education in 1999. He and his wife Robyn (Sicard) were married in July 2005 and presently reside in Mecosta County. They have a one-year old son, Cas (born 9/10/07) and are expecting their second child this season.



BILL KILLIAN

Volunteer
Assistant Coach



Bill Killian returns to the Ferris State men's basketball program for his seventh season as a volunteer assistant coach on head coach Bill Sall's Bulldog staff.

Killian, who previously served for seven seasons as an assistant under former FSU head coach Tom Ludwig, assists with the on-court instruction

and skill development of FSU's players.

A native of Chicago, Ill., Killian is employed as a professor in the physical sciences department at Ferris State. Killian, who has worked at Ferris since 1987, teaches courses in both general and industrial chemistry. In addition, he also is the coordinator for Ferris' Industrial Chemistry Technology program.

Besides being involved in the Bulldog men's basketball program, Killian also was a volunteer assistant in the FSU baseball program under Judd Folske from 1988-92. He has also worked as a part-time professional baseball scout.

As a collegiate athlete, Killian earned four letters each in basketball and baseball at North Park College in Chicago, Ill. He went on to complete his masters degree and worked as a graduate assistant at Ohio State.

After leaving Ohio State, Killian became the head baseball coach at St. Francis DeSales High School in Columbus, Ohio. He led DeSales to a 92-26 record and a state championship in 1979 before returning to North Park as an assistant basketball coach. During his tenure at his alma mater, North Park won an NCAA Division III National Championship in 1986. He also served one year as the head basketball coach at George Williams College in Illinois.

Killian and his wife, Michele, reside in Stanwood, Mich., and have three sons, Joe, Dan and Billy. Billy was a third-round pick of the San Diego Padres in the 2004 Major League Baseball draft as the 72nd overall selection. He was the highest Michigan prep player drafted in 2004 and is currently playing in the Chicago White Sox organization. Dan began his professional career this past summer in the Washington Nationals organization.
