CRYSTAL HARRIS
 Assistant Coach ♦ Second Season
 California-Riverside, 2005

Crystal Harris is in her second season as Ferris' assistant coach. Harris assists with the program's administrative, coaching and recruiting responsibilities.

A native of Vista, Calif., Harris arrived at FSU with significant playing experience on the professional level. She formerly played professionally for a season in the National Women's Basketball League (NWBL) for the San Diego Siego. Additionally, she played internationally in Switzerland for Club Elfic, Fribourg. Harris also played in Demark for Club HBC.

Harris, who led both of her international teams in scoring and rebounding, helped guide the San Diego Siego to a first place league finish while her Club HBC squad earned a bronze medal in Denmark.

A 2005 graduate of the University of California-Riverside with a degree in Sociology, Harris was a three-time All-Big West Conference honoree for the Highlanders at the NCAA Division I level. The two-time team Most Valuable Player Award recipient scored over 1,000 career points at the collegiate level and is on the school's all-time leaders list in more than 16 statistical categories.

Harris started 26 of 28 games her final season (2003-04) and finished second among Cal-Riverside's leading scorers by averaging 15.2 points per contest. She shot 43% from the floor and tallied five rebounds a game as a senior. Harris averaged 10 points or more in each of her final three seasons of collegiate action and twice

served as team captain.

As a collegiate athlete, Harris was active in the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) along with the SAMS (Student-Athlete Mentors) program. During her playing career, she's had the opportunity to play with and against a number of current and former WNBA players such as Ruth Riley (San Antonio Silver Stars), Becky Hammon (San Antonio Silver Stars) and Loree Moore (New York Liberty).

Harris attended high school and competed on the prep level for the Rancho Buena Vista Longhorns in Vista, Calif. The four-year letterwinner was a three-time All-Palomar League recipient and a two-time all-county selection. The team captain twice earned team MVP honors and tallied over 1,000 career points on the prep level. In addition to basketball, she also participated in softball and volleyball. Harris, who received the school's female Student-Athlete of the Year Award in 2000, also received both conference and county recognition as a volleyball player. She also served as an athletic chairman.

The daughter of Jeff and Cheri Harris, Crystal currently resides in Big Rapids. Her father played football at BYU.

MARK DENOYELLES
 Volunteer Assistant Coach ♦ First Season

Mark DeNoyelles is in his first season at FSU as a volunteer assistant coach and brings a wealth of previous coaching experience.

DeNoyelles is the father of two current Bulldog players as his oldest, Stephanie, is a sophomore guard on this year's team and younger sister, Kelsey, is a freshman.

He previously served as the head girls basketball coach at Mount Pleasant Sacred Heart High School where he recorded a 141-28 overall record leading the squad from 2001-08. His 2008 team played in the state title game and his teams won seven league crowns, six district championships and three regional titles.

DeNoyelles was honored as the BCAM Class D State Coach of the Year in both 2003 and 2008 along with being a two-time regional coach of the year.

The Caro, Mich., native played collegiate basketball at Saginaw Valley State from 1974-76 and graduated from Central Michigan in 1979. He was a two-time all-state pick as a prepster.

He currently resides in Mt. Pleasant along with his wife, Sandy.

RICK BLOODWORTH
 Volunteer Assistant Coach ♦ Third Season

Rick Bloodworth is in his third season as a volunteer assistant coach at Ferris, but brings along a wealth of coaching experience.

Bloodworth, who's the father of FSU head

coach Tracey Dorow, most recently served from 1987 to 2006 as a collegiate head women's basketball junior college coach at Lake Michigan College in Benton Harbor, Mich. In addition, he served as the head girls basketball coach at St. Joseph (Mich.) High School from 1976 to 2006.

Bloodworth posted an overall basketball head coaching record of 879-472 during his tenure at the prep and collegiate levels.

In addition to serving as the head girls coach at St. Joseph, Bloodworth also was the boys basketball coach from 1982-86. He was the school's softball coach from 1982-97 after serving as the boys tennis coach from 1975-81. Bloodworth received his coaching start by leading the boys basketball team at Adrian Madison High School in 1970-71.

A 1970 University of Michigan graduate, Bloodworth

played collegiate basketball for the Wolverines from 1966-70. While at UM, he was a teammate and roommate of Rudy Tomjanovich, who later became head coach of the NBA's Houston Rockets.

As a prepster, Bloodworth participated in basketball, baseball and football for Ferndale High School. He helped guide the Eagles to Michigan Class A state hoops titles in both 1963 and 1966 while earning all-conference and all-state laurels.

Bloodworth, who enjoys playing tennis, currently resides in St. Joseph along with his wife, Joyce. The couple also has one other daughter, Andrea, who is an assistant women's basketball coach at NCAA-I Liberty University.
