Fifty students across West Michigan successfully completed the Promesa Summer Success program in Grand Rapids, Holland, and Oceana County. Students completed seven college credits in eight weeks—five of the students are now enrolled at Ferris.

A QUOTE TO REMEMBER (This one is from our founder Woodbridge N. Ferris)

“Thank God! in my own veins there is not a drop (allowing me to be the judge) of race hatred. I know of no man of different color or of a different race whom, retaining his manhood, I am not willing to sit beside at the table or to work with wherever and whenever the work demands the co-operation of two men. Thank God! I have been born destitute of anything that savors of race hatred!”¹
