International Education Week

Since that time there has been significant growth in our University's international efforts, including the faculty-developed Globalization Initiative, a review of general education and, now, increased numbers of international students. One of the points of pride for Ferris State University throughout has been the substantial number of faculty who have been chosen, travelled and worked as Fulbright scholars. Very few universities have enjoyed such recognition and success in the Fulbright program.

Their Fulbright study and experience includes scholarship in Belgium, Belize, Botswana, Cyprus, England, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Japan, Korea, Namibia, Norway, Paraguay, Poland, Romania, Russia, Spain, Sudan, Syria and Tunisia.

Today at 3 p.m. a plaque honoring Ferris Fulbrighters will be dedicated in the IRC. This evening at 7 p.m. in BUS 111 there will be a panel discussion, "Ferris Fulbright Scholars: Promoting the International Ties that Bind Us." The panel includes faculty Marietta Bell-Scribner, John Jablonski, Phillip Middleton, Philip Sterling and special guest Jane L. Anderson, executive director of the Fulbright Association. I encourage you to attend and learn about the Fulbright program and its success at Ferris.

Athletics

Ferris student-athletes continue to experience extraordinary success, including the women's and men's cross country teams which travelled to compete in the Greater Louisville Classic this weekend. The women, ranked third nationally, finished 2nd in the Gold Division behind the University of Michigan. Mississippi, Purdue, South Florida, Alabama, and Illinois State University are Division I schools which finished behind Ferris. Senior All-American Tina Muir finished 2nd among 262 competitors. The men placed 2nd among 33 teams in the Blue Division behind Division I school Lipscomb University.

The volleyball team defeated Saginaw Valley at home on Saturday and then Grand Valley on the road on Sunday, taking both matches 3-0. The women are ranked 17th in the nation, have an overall record of 13-1, are undefeated at home and have won eight matches in a row.

Saturday evening the football team defeated Lake Erie 38-14. The men are 4-1 and have won three in a row. Congratulations to head coach Jeff Pierce who earned his 100th victory at Ferris State University. Although it does not seem possible, hockey season has begun. In Sunday's exhibition we defeated the University of Toronto 5-0.

Helping Others

All weekend Ferris athletes helped support Breast Cancer Awareness Month. As part of the pregame before Saturday evening's football game, spectators threw more than 1,500 pink flying discs on the field. While this fell short of a world record for the number of disks in the air at one time, it was a wonderful example of how our University reaches out to help others.

There are many other examples. Each year a group of Ferris employees raises funds through the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life event. This year they had an innovative race theme and raised more than \$14,000 to help fight cancer.

The annual United Way fund campaign began last week, with a goal to raise \$67,000 in Big Rapids this year. The United Way supports many crucial efforts, working with youth, the elderly and those in need throughout west Michigan. One gift can support many important organizations helping people in our local community. When a United Way volunteer calls on you, I hope you will support this very important cause.
