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## **Ferris Student Mourned**

Last week Ferris was deeply shocked and saddened by the death of Demia Marie Davis, an 18-year-old student from Madison Heights. Our Department of Public Safety was dispatched to Clark Hall last Monday, Nov. 14, after Ms. Davis' roommate found her unresponsive. Our Counseling Center has made its services available to students and others affected by this tragedy. I want to thank everyone who has helped our University community through this difficult period.

The sense of vitality and potential that our students bring to a college campus is one of the reasons why many of us choose to work in education. We are all saddened when a young person does not have the opportunity to realize that potential. I know that you join me in extending our deepest condolences to Ms. Davis' family and friends.

## **Budget Forum Materials**

My thanks to those of you who attended my budget forum last Thursday. While we continue to face many challenges at both the state and national level in terms of higher education funding, there is also some cause for optimism. As I noted in my presentation, Michigan has a balanced budget and ended FY 2011 with a \$500 million estimated surplus. Because of this improved fiscal outlook I do not anticipate we will face a mid-year funding reduction this year and while it is too early to be certain, there are prospects that we may not receive a reduction for next year. It has been some time since I have presented a budget forum without asking for further budget reductions. Throughout this period everyone at our University has been asked to conserve resources, reduce budgets and assume more responsibilities. Thank you for your ongoing extra efforts.

Significant concerns and uncertainties do remain. The slides from my presentation point out the increasing dependence of our students on Pell Grants. These awards currently total more than \$25 million and are at risk of being diminished with the uncertain budget situation in Washington. There also remain substantial economic challenges in Michigan, with our unemployment rate of 11 percent, the third highest in the country. During this spring's upcoming legislative session we will face the prospect of a funding formula for state universities, as well as the possibility of community colleges being allowed to offer bachelor degrees. Both would have a major impact on Ferris.

While there are more reasons this fall for optimism, there are also troubling long-term trends in the rapidly rising costs of health care coverage, tuition rates and the average debt load of our students. These are topics I will return to in budget sessions next semester.
