

President's Memorandum to Faculty and Staff

In the midst of snowy weather and cold temperatures, and with a final flurry of events, the end of the semester has arrived. I want to take this opportunity to encourage you to attend commencement and celebrate one of the most special days of the academic year. This is a time when the work of the entire University community comes together as we recognize our students who have completed their degrees.

The December Commencement has two ceremonies – 10:00 a.m. for the colleges of Allied Health Sciences, Education and Human Services, and Technology; 1:30 p.m. for the colleges of Arts and Sciences, and Business. Dr. Robert N. McCullough, associate professor of Mathematics, will serve as the speaker for both the morning and afternoon ceremonies. Professor McCullough was chosen last spring as one of the University's Distinguished Teachers for 2004-05. His special interest lies in the mathematics needed for space exploration, and he regularly reviews publications for science books and films.

As a regional resource person for the National Air and Space Museum, he has given more than 130 presentations on space exploration. He has also written and presented several papers on the mathematics used by the Wright Brothers to prove that flight was possible, and in January was an invited participant for the Calculus Teaching Focus Group at the American Mathematical Society/Mathematical Association of America's annual meeting in Atlanta.

I am delighted that Vice President Michael Harris and Academic Affairs have scheduled both a breakfast and lunch for faculty who are attending the commencement ceremonies. We both want to make certain faculty have the opportunity to congratulate the graduates they have helped prepare. As a result we are encouraging faculty to greet graduates and shake their hands as they leave the commencement stage after our students receive their degree. Please join us in congratulating our graduates at this special time of the year.

Helping Others

In last week's message I offered some examples of community service and contributions by our students, faculty, and staff. Since that time I have received a number of messages and notes from you about the amazing work you are doing with our students in helping to make a difference for others. While I cannot share all the messages I have received, I do want to share a few -

"You had asked for input regarding community volunteer activities and I'd like to share one that pharmacy students have been involved in for the past three years. Each fall, the off-campus P-3 students choose organizations to benefit from angel tree gifts. In the past, students and faculty have donated gifts to families served by the YWCA Domestic Assault Program, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, and foster care children in Grand Rapids (D. A. Blodgett for Children) and Kalamazoo (Family and Children Services). These organizations are so grateful that busy students and faculty will take time to shop for specific gifts and wrap them for needy children - just weeks before exams! We have delivered car loads of gifts each year, as we will again this year."

"After reading your memorandum, I wanted to send you a quick note to let you know about a great group of students I have the pleasure of working with. I am currently the advisor for the Ferris Idols and this semester they have been working very closely with the local office for Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Although the RSO has been around for several years, they have changed their focus this semester to helping the youth of the Big Rapids and Mecosta County area. This group of students has gone through the application and interview process to be official Big Brothers or Big Sisters, and I am proud to let you know that we have helped to make over 20 matches with young children in the area! In addition to the one-on-one time that these students have spent with their 'little', these students have also planned and coordinated several events for groups of these children and their families. They had a Halloween party at our U-REC, a Thanksgiving dinner at Cafe Ferris, and this coming Saturday they are planning a Holiday party to be held at the U-REC."

"It is great that there are so many students on campus getting involved in the community up in Big Rapids. I just want to let you know what my students are doing in the community of Kalamazoo. Because all of us clinical pharmacy folks have appointments at local health care institutions and our students work with us, we have unique opportunities to serve our communities. My site is especially suited for student participation in the community as I am at a Federally Qualified Health Center in Kalamazoo (The Family Health Center), where we serve the Medicaid and under/not insured members of our community. As well, we have a homeless clinic where we serve those without homes. My students spend 1/2 day a week providing clinical pharmacy services at the Healthcare for the Homeless clinic, as

well as 6 more 1/2 days a week providing services in their clinics. The clinic has just received a grant to provide health care in clinic in an elementary school, and I anticipate my students will also be participating in that venture (we had in the past before they lost the previous grant funding the clinic). Thanks for caring about the great work that our students are doing!! It is stretching some of their horizons, and they are growing as people and as professionals.”

“Many thanks to Gerri Gomber, Melanie, and the folks in student services. They contributed FSU items to two packages sent to servicemen. Two names were chosen from *anysoldier.com* and mailed in anticipation of delivery prior to Christmas. Some students in MGMT 301 also wrote nice notes to soldiers. Both soldiers and their divisions are in Iraq. The concern and generosity of the Ferris community is heartwarming.”
