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A Historical Perspective From the Director:

WOW, twenty-five years! With the Authorization of Northridge Academy in 1997 Ferris State University embarked on a journey to join in the transformation of the Michigan K-12 educational landscape through the advancement of public-school academies (charter schools). Then FSU President Dr. William Sederberg undertook this journey because he believed in educational equity and parental choice and saw charter schools as a way to help achieve those objectives.

The journey has not always been an easy one. Due to their disruptive nature to the Michigan educational scene PSAs were not welcomed by many of the status quo, and the struggle for acceptance is still very much alive in 2023 as it was in 1994 when Central Michigan University authorized Michigan's first charter school. Yet, the movement has preserved and grown. There are now 239 active charter schools in operation in Michigan, with approximately 10.7% of Michigan's K-12 students attending a charter.

Ferris' role as a PSA Authorizer has changed dramatically since its first foray into the authorizing world. Truth be told, the first few years of authorizing were very much like building the proverbial airplane as it was heading down the runway. The field of authorizing was relatively new, and everyone seemed to have a different view of what authorizing should look like. Here in Michigan, we were fortunate to have skilled leaders such as Dr. James Goenner, then at Central Michigan University who organized the Michigan authorizers into a monthly group that met and shared best practices, discussed issues and shared notes. That humble group is now the Michigan Council of Charter School Authorizers whose members authorize 88% of the charters in the State. The Council was one of the first state- organizations in the country organized specially for public charter school academy authorizers.

In 2014, The Council established the nation's first statewide public charter school authorizing accreditation and assurance process to demonstrate the commitment to quality that Michigan authorizers strive to achieve. Partnering with nationally recognized Cognia (Formerly AdvancED), The Council set about moving beyond the basic practice known as "continuous improvement" to create a more rigorous definition of what it means to be an effective authorizer. I am proud to tell you that the Ferris State University Charter Schools Office has been accredited by this agency since 2017.

Our work is far from done, however. Even though the development of a new public school academy is a multi-step process sometimes taking years, the real work begins with the academy's opening. The role of an authorizer then changes to 'oversight' of the operations, governance, and performance (academic and fiscal) of the academy. At FSU, our Mission states that the office, "... focuses on student growth and achievement, offers professional learning opportunities, and provides relevant resources to its authorized public school academies." This is a charge the CSO takes seriously, and our office has spent several million dollars over the years by offering workshops, reimbursements, grants, camps, scholarships, and providing expensive testing platforms such as the NWEA free of charge to our authorized academies. At FSU we believe we have a responsibility to help ensure the overall success of each of our academies, even though we do not have an active role in their day-to-day operation.

As we move into a new era, our mission, and our commitment to it remains unchanged. Especially post-pandemic, we are very much committed to providing support to our academies as they recover from the disruption COVID's toll took on all K-12 students' learning. This support is a partnership that is highly personalized to each academy based on their needs. Above all, the CSO works with each academy using relevant performance data in planning and decision making. The CSO assists academies by providing extensive data to each academy regarding academic and fiscal performance.


What will the next 25 years hold for Michigan's public school academies? While it is impossible to tell for sure, I believe that parents will still want choice in making decisions about their child's education, and that charter schools will still play a vital role in providing that choice. Along with the demand for choice I also believe that competition will continue to drive higher levels of academic performance for all of Michigan's K-12 schools. This was the exact reason for the initial creation of charter schools in Michigan and around the country. The number of charter schools may change in the future, but the core function and mission upon which they were established will still be intact long into the future. Ferris State University looks forward to being a relevant part of this future!





Ferris Authorized Schools 2022-2023 Combined Totals









Student Enrollment Over Time




