Greetings from the Associate Director

New Policies and Procedures for Public Schools

I wanted to make sure school leaders and board members are aware of some of the new requirements that have been approved for public schools in Michigan. I needed to split up the new requirements into two newsletters because of the volume of information! When discussing and dealing with all of these new mandates, boards and staff need to do some research on their own, involve legal and financial consultants, attend any ISD or MDE workshops, check for relevant policies that might need modifying, and involve all stakeholders when finalizing procedures. I will share some limited information on seclusion and restraint, new civics contents and assessment, teaching genocide, and CPR Training in this newsletter and address Zero Tolerance/Restorative Practices, Third Grade Reading Legislation, and Opioid Antagonists in the next one.



Basically, using S/R tactics with students will not be allowed for outbursts or behavior issues. Public Acts 394 and 395 and House Bills 5409-5417 of 2016 limit the use of S/R to emergency situations, where a student's behavior poses an "imminent risk" to the safety of the student or another and behavior is such that immediate intervention is required. If school officials do resort to S/R methods, they will need to report it to administrators, parents and the Michigan Department of Education (MDE). One element of the legislation is the requirement that schools must train and identify staff members called "Key Identified Personnel" (KIP). KIPs are called in when an emergency situation arises that might require S/R methods and stay until the emergency is gone. The comprehensive training for KIPs is substantial, so they should become your local go-to person for S/R issues. Involve your KIP in documenting events and

Assessment News

Your academy should be well into the Winter Testing Window! I know there have been a few technological glitches—please do not hesitate to contact tech support if you run into a technological issue. The tech support specialists are highly trained to address the behind-the-scenes issues that may arise, and will often be able to troubleshoot your problem in minutes. If you have a question about data interpretation or specifics about the reports—that's where I come in!

MAJOR UPDATES: Two major updates have become live since the last newsletter:

- M-STEP Linking Study was completed. This is HUGE! This now allows you to see what a student's projected proficiency is expected to be based on their performance on their most recent MAP assessment. As you can see, for students to be projected to be proficient, they have to be slightly above the Norm for their grade level. This correlates almost directly with the study I did comparing our portfolio students M-STEP and spring MAP performance. REMEMBER: Just because a student doesn't make that benchmark, doesn't mean they won't be proficient—these correlations are to show likely or anticipated proficiency.
- NWEA Help Center: What's New for Educators: (login is required) highlights the
 changes to the Student Profile Report that was released earlier this year. This
 report will continue to expand over the course of the next academic year. NWEA
 Community is a great place to find shared resources and tips from other NWEA
 MAP users.

Educational Goals

Many of you have been asking about our Educational Goals for the 2016-2017 school year. On behalf of all of us at the CSO, we do apologize for the delay. The main reason for the delay is that we would like to construct a goal policy that can remain in place for more than one year. Our goal is that we would like to view these contractual goals, and performance on them, not just as yearly marks, but as a way to gauge a school's effectiveness over time.

That being said, we can share with you the assessments that we will be using for our goals:

Grades	Assessment	Туре
2-8*	NWEA MAP	Growth, Achievement
9-11	PSAT/SAT	Growth, Achievement
3-8	M-STEP	Growth, Achievement

^{*2016-2017} will be the last year that 9th and 10th grade MAP will be required. Schools will have the option to continue using the MAP assessment for those grades if they would like, but it will not be used as an accountability piece.

In regards to achievement benchmarks or targets, we are moving away from having a specific score or benchmark as the standard for attainment. Rather, we are looking more at a systemic process—are your scores moving up?—both numerically and relative to other schools/systems. For example, rather than saying 3rd grade math must average a RIT of 203.4, did an academy's RIT (and consequently their national percentile ranking) progress forward.
