185 (34%) surveys were received by the committee.


The sum of the responses for some of the questions do not add up to 100% because a few emeriti gave more than one response per question.






Result (from a conversation with Jim Cook, manager of technical services)

As is customary, my email account was terminated, without any notice, a few days after my retirement date. Fortunately, I had been warned by other faculty that this would occur, so I had transferred addresses and messages to another account. Otherwise, I would have permanently lost them all. In spite of doing this, I know that by not having my Ferris email address I am losing important mail from publishers and other academic contacts. I cannot receive campus-wide notices, which are much more complete that what is listed on the Ferris website. I will miss retirement receptions of people I have worked with for years, and many other activities, simply because I won't know about them. The University is losing valuable support by so shabbily treating its emeriti. Some of us consider ourselves professionals, and would like to continue to be involved with Ferris. One way to encourage continued activity, beyond continuing our Lotus Notes address, would be to provide office support to emeriti. (The office in Prakken really is for the Emeriti Association, and is not practical for individual use.) The best place to provide office support might be in FLITE, which is open many hours and has a faculty support area already. This area, suitably equipped, could be made available to emeriti with little effort and expense.

- 64) I have been retired from Ferris for 22 years. I live 2500 miles from Ferris and now am 80 years old. I winter in the desert of SE California, so for 5 months each year I am even further from Ferris. Thanks for the questionnaire.

- 112) I am in time for such a short time. Winters are spent in Florida. With 8 children and 23 grandchildren. I am kept very busy.
- 113) Would like to see "high speed internet" service made available to emeriti. Would like computer "help" and "service" available to emeriti.
- 115) I would be interested in being involved in some of these activities if I was still living in the Big Rapids area. Thank you for the opportunity to be involved in your survey.
- 117) Question? Do we (emeriti) have the ability to purchase discounted software, same as faculty?
- 119) I just got home for the holidays and this survey was at the house—I hope it reaches the senate in time to be included.
- 122) I would appreciate having Dr. in my address rather than "Mr." Also please send me a recent/current FSU catalog so I can survey current programs and faculty. Send to...
- 124) Keep up serving FSU
- 126) Thanks for the phone call reminding me of the survey.
- 128) Distance from home to campus and return makes many of the options generally non-workable! Did this for many years—now?

- 130) Currently serving on the APRC for computer network and electronics. Have taught 4 semesters since retiring.
- 131) Well designed and easy to read.
- 133) Being part of the emeriti as a spouse has been very beneficial as I enjoy the lunch speakers and programs.
- 137) Allowing emeriti to audit classes free of charge if seats are vacant would be, I should think, a <u>huge</u> benefit to students and the teacher. I wish I could have had older adults add their perspective to my classes when I was teaching. If we could access Ferris library databases from home (especially if we live away from Big Rapids), it would help cement the emeriti community to Ferris. This might be less expensive than sponsoring emeriti get-togethers around the country.
- 141) How about free or reduced fees for flu shots? On campus, parking permits appreciated. Increased bookstore discounts. I believe the school should do as much as possible to keep the emeriti engaged with significant fee reductions in every area mentioned in this survey. The cost to the University by reducing or waving the fees questioned, I believe would benefit the University financially in the future. The more you feel your school cares about you, the more you're going to care about it.
- 148) I have been involved with the emeriti assoc. I am somewhat concerned about some seeming inconsistencies on benefits available to faculty and not consistently there for emeriti. It seems many entry fees are pretty expensive. That is the problem with having been around too long—We used to have a staff dressing room in HPE and used all facilities for nothing including towel service; when retiring they got free use of Katke golf course and entrance to athletic events except hockey. Things could be worse—we have more benefits than many of our colleges at other universities in Mich.
- 155) I will be 84 in January—I am beyond my experiences at Ferris—my interests are now in other areas—nicely formulated survey though!
- 157) I do not feel "abandoned". I go in to the optometry college once a week and am involved in a research project with my replacement.
- 158) Until last year I lived 16+ hours (drive) from Ferris. Therefore #s 12-13 would have been impossible for participation. I am still 5+ hours away and that makes it difficult to provide assistance (#14).
- 159) I recruit for my program to HS and Tech. Centers. If University would pay gas costs and a meal, I think many more emeriti would help!

- 172) It is clear that FSU is under-utilizing its retired faculty and/or later inviting them to appropriate events.
- 173) My years were some of the best years of our life. My husband of 45 years died in 2000 and I am thankful to be healthy and able to share my talents training and experience helping others.
- 177) Ferris was great for me and my family. Nothing but happy thoughts for the 24 years of service. I've been back to campus three times and back to Big Rapids four times since 1990. Do I miss Ferris? Yes, I do. It was a great opportunity and a very enjoyable time.
- 179) I was vice-president of Belize University for 15 months. One day a rep. of a school in Houston, TX, blustered into the office and demanded to know when I was leaving. He had 3 bodyguards. My answer: "when we can turn the entire operation over to Belize." That did not improve his disposition. With no building, we held night classes in the Teacher's building. We were in a filled area in a mangrove swamp. I could see 42 black termite nests, each about 3 feet in diameter. The Creole philosophy is interesting. Any plant with no name is a wild thing to be destroyed. The grounds keep cut a beautiful Blue Bells bush because he did not know a name for it.
