The Tombstone Project: A Graphic Display to Heighten Awareness and Proactive Responses Across Disciplines toward Domestic Violence

III. Specific core value, strategic initiative, or goal related to diversity that the event will address. (See the University Strategic Plan and the Diversity Plan)

More specifically, the Tombstone Project directly relates to Diversity Plan Strategic Goal #4 which states: Create environments for student learning that are inclusive of and sensitive to a diverse student population. This event is designed to directly address proactive ways to assist victims of domestic violence.

The Tombstone Project is a graphic display recording the stories of individuals who lost their lives in Michigan during the past year due to domestic violence. The display is accompanied by a panel presentation that is designed to educate proactive responses toward domestic violence across professions that Ferris students are preparing to enter after graduation. For a three week period, the campus community will see artistic renderings of tombstones, set up in the quad, bearing the date of birth, date of death, gender, and an excerpt from the police report describing the cause of the victim's death. At the end of this three week period, a panel of campus professionals will speak shortly on ways that domestic violence is proactively treated in medical fields, criminal justice professions, and education. Snacks are offered. A flash card educating attendees on proactive responses to domestic violence in personal life, and phone numbers where resources are quickly accessed will be handed out. This event is will occur in October, in

association with the Take Back the Night March, as part of Ferris' commitment to raising awareness about domestic violence.

## V. Event Narrative (up to 4 pages single-spaced)

The Tombstone Project is designed to support the goals of the General Education requirement of Social Awareness that is shared by all disciplines at Ferris State University. The Social Awareness criterion is designed to both include the experiences of diverse people's concerns on the campus, and to prepare students to work with and include the interests of diverse communities in their future professional lives. We expect that the tombstones and their stories will have a strong impact on viewers, and that the information that the panel attendees gain will help them in their current personal lives and future professional careers. Additionally, faculty and staff working across disciplines will create community and display their commitment to the importance of Social Awareness in education.

## Ferris defines the outcomes criteria for Social Awareness as:

In a culturally diverse nation and a changing world, social awareness is essential to graduates' interpersonal relationships, professional competence, and responsible citizenship. Therefore, graduates should be able to understand and address issues involving social institutions, interpersonal and group dynamics, social tradition and change, cultural diversity, and human development behavior.

**Domestic violence** is socially framed as a gendered issue primarily impacting women. It is true that it is women who most often lose their lives in domestic violence. Yet, children and men are also victims of this crime. The tombstone project will illustrate that we need to be prepared to observe signs of domestic violence across age and sex categories and to respond proactively.

The entire event will occur in the month of October in Association with other domestic violence awareness activities. We plan to work closely with the group organizing the take Back the Night March and other RSOs on campus. Tombstones will be created on October 7<sup>th</sup> starting at 9am. Donna Guiliaini, chair of Sociology and Anthropology at Delta College will lead students and faculty in constructing the tombstones. She has organized the Tombstone Project at Delta for several years. Students and faculty will erected the tombstones at the end of Homecoming week, the week of October the 11<sup>th</sup>. The panel discussion will take place Thursday, October 21<sup>st</sup> from 11-12 in the IRC. The Take Back the Night March follows the panel on Monday, October 25<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Attendee Learning & Assessment**

A Panel of Ferris Faculty & Staff from across disciplines will speak shortly on topics related to domestic violence awareness and appropriate proactive responses in both personal and professional life. A short assessment survey will be handed out during the panel, and collected at the door as people leave. The assessment will focus on the two

primary learning outcomes: raising awareness about domestic violence, and gaining information on proactive responses toward domestic violence. Appetizers, ice tea, and lemonade will be available at the event. 250 people are expected to attend. Attendees will be offered information and handouts on how to be aware of the signs of domestic violence in personal relationships, what to avoid, how to respond, and the location of resources on campus, community, and society. Participants will be told what professionals look for in various fields, and how they are expected to respond at work to domestic violence. Speakers will be encouraged to create informational materials to distribute to attendees. We will create a handout the size of a flash card with bullets emphasizing that anyone can be a victim of domestic violence, domestic violence is everyone's responsibility, and short list of domestic violence resources with phone numbers and web addresses.
