The 2009 FSU MLK Week Celebration "Let Freedom Ring"

January 2009 will mark the 4th year that Ferris State University has sponsored a week full of programming geared towards celebrating the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This year the Celebration is planned to run from Sunday, January 18th – Thursday January 22nd. The MLK Planning Committee is convinced that this year's program will continue to raise the level of commitment that Ferris State University has towards the ideal of diversity. How? Through support of this event, FSU will display a variety of ideas, beliefs and cultures all affected by the work of Dr. King. In turn, campuses all over, and students here will see that Ferris just does not talk about the concept but lives it.

The goals of the 2009 MLK Week at Ferris State University are to enhance the level of knowledge, appreciation and understanding of Dr. King and his work as it relates to Ferris State University. Every student, faculty and staff member in their own way have experienced life differently due to the work of Dr. King and that needs to be continually revisited as a new group of individuals become a part of our FSU community. The intended outcome of the co-curricular programming, speakers, etc. of the 2009 MLK Week is for students to take with them knowledge that they can relate to, an enhanced level of identification and appreciation, and overall openness to acceptance of the ideal of diversity.

The 2009 MLK Week at Ferris State University relates to several curriculums but mostly to the discipline of U.S. History and International Relations. From exhibits such as the Tunnel of Oppression, individuals will be educated on several social groups that have been "oppressed" over a period of time in the United States and the World as we know it. Issues such as Darfur will be focused on as a piece to educate the campus about oppression and compare to that of the time of Dr. King.

The 2009 MLK Week committee started planning for the celebration in September 2008 and continues to have bi-weekly meetings throughout the semester. After Thanksgiving Break 2008, the committee will meet every week to prepare for the celebration January 18 – 22nd 2009. During the beginning meetings, ideas and suggestions are put on the table for the celebration. Throughout the later meetings from November through January, the 2009 MLK Week committee works to finalize sponsorships, advertisement and coordination for the activities of the week.

The anticipated target audience of the 2009 MLK Week celebration at Ferris State University is diverse in both its numbers and demographics. Overall hundreds of individuals who are students, faculty and staff, community members, and visitors from other universities make up the audience for various programs throughout the week. What attributes to the audience is the amount of publicity of the events and the timeliness of that action. The earlier we advertise for the events the more participation and awareness the activities can prove to be effective.

The specific impact that the 2009 MLK Week celebration will have on Ferris State University is one of necessary urgency and support. Proactively the MLK committee plans to impact the campus each year in a way that all can be proud of and that would best represent our university's mission and values.
