
FERRIS STATE UNIVERSITY Legacy of Diversity and Inclusion

A Remarkable Experience of Black Education during Jim Crow

Between 1910 and the mid-1920s, more than sixty black students from the South bravely traveled north to Ferris Institute, a small, mostly white school in Big Rapids, Michigan. They came to enroll in college programs and college preparatory courses—and to escape, if only temporarily, the daily and ubiquitous indignities suffered under the Jim Crow racial hierarchy. They excelled in their studies and became accomplished in their professional fields. Many went on to both ignite and help lead the explosive civil rights movement. Very few people know their stories—until now.

Haste to Rise is a book about the incredible resilience and breathtaking accomplishments of those students. It was written to unearth, contextualize, and share their stories and important lessons with this generation. Along the way we are introduced to dozens of these Jim Crow-era students, including the first African American to win a case before the U.S. Supreme Court, Belford Lawson, the lead attorney in New Negro Alliance v. Sanitary Grocery Co. (1938), a landmark court battle that safeguarded the right to picket. We also meet one of Lawson's contemporaries, Percival L. Prattis, a pioneering journalist and influential newspaper executive. In 1947, he became the first African American news correspondent admitted to the U.S. House and Senate press galleries. There is also an in-depth look into the life and work of the institute's founder, Woodbridge Nathan Ferris, a racial justice pioneer who created educational opportunities for women, international students, and African Americans.

Haste to Rise is a challenge to others to look beyond a university's official history and seek a more complete knowledge of its past. This is American history done right!


Ferris State University History Task Force






Early African Americans At Ferris

Within the first 15 years of the Ferris Institute, African American students have been a part of the fabric of the institution. Prominent African American leaders such as John E. Bush and Edgar McDaniel, (leading members of Booker T. Washington's National Negro Business League), send their sons to the Ferris Institute. Chester E. Bush and Edgar McDaniel Jr. both earned business degrees from Ferris in 1905.


Famed early "Negro League" baseball star Nate Harris also has a connection with Ferris. Harris, enrolled as a student while playing and coaching the 1902 and 1903. Ferris Institute football team and winning a championship in 1902. He was one of the earliest African Americans to coach at a predominately white institution.

Between 1910 and the mid-1920s, dozens of African
American students from the South traveled north to Ferris
Institute. They came to enroll in college programs and
college preparatory courses. They excelled in their studies

Many went on to both ignite and help lead the explosive
civil rights movement.

The story of these students speaks to the real commitment the Ferris Institute has always had at providing opportunities to all the students all the time. When most doors were closed to African American students during this time, the Ferris Institute provided an opportunity and became a springboard for many impressive careers and civil rights champions.







Diverse Speakers at Ferris

Mr. Ferris was inspired and driven by the many speakers he had heard in his youth. Speakers like Frederick Douglass, Henry Ward Beecher, Harriet Beecher Stowe, and Victoria Woodhull left a lasting impression on Woodbridge and helped shape his worldview. After the Ferris established their school, they wanted to pass on opportunities to inspire the men and women who attended the Ferris Institute, thus Morning Exercises were created. Morning exercises as defined by Mr. Ferris himself:

In these readings the lives and thoughts of many great men and women are presented. Every possible effort is put forth to awaken the students to a realization of their possibilities."

These readings exposed the campus to a wide range of diverse works and ideas. The campus has always been a place where diverse speakers have had the opportunity to speak. Famed activists like Naomi Tutu and Deloris speak. Famed activists like Naomi Tutu and Deloris Huerta have spoken on the Ferris campus. Politicians such as Jessie Jackson and notable orators Dick Gregory, Alex Haley, and Maya Angelou also graced the stages on the Big Rapids campus.

However, there was probably no one more famous and prominent than when Booker T. Washington spoke to a sold out, excited crowd in 1902 on the Ferris campus. Washington, the legendary Tuskegee Institute founder would later be eulogized by Mr. Ferris in 1915 who called Washington the Prince of Educators.
