#### **HISTORY**

Established in 1884 by Woodbridge N. and Helen Gillespie Ferris, the University today continues its founders' vision of providing a career-oriented education that meets the challenges of a changing economy. Woodbridge, a distinguished Michigan educator and politician who served two terms as the state's governor and was an elected United States Senator, and Helen, co-founder and teacher, built their school on the concept of not only providing students with marketable skills, but giving students opportunities regardless of race, age, or status. Ferris was a private institute until 1950, when it joined the state higher education system. The college obtained university status in 1987.

#### **LOCATION**

Ferris State University's main campus is in Big Rapids, a west central Michigan town of approximately 10,600 in the vacation-recreation region. In addition to being home of Ferris State University, Big Rapids is the county seat of Mecosta County. The 930-acre campus is readily accessible by the US-131 expressway and state highway M-20. Big Rapids is 55 miles north of Grand Rapids and within 200 miles of Chicago and Detroit.

#### **ADMISSIONS**

Current admission criteria for new students require all incoming freshmen students to submit official high school transcripts or official GED scores and if available, ACT or SAT test prior to an admission decision. Transfer students are required to submit official transcripts from all colleges attended as well as official high school transcripts and test scores to achieve a complete academic profile. Students fulfilling both university and program entrance requirements will be granted admission to the University.

#### **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS**

Ferris offers more than 190 educational programs through the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business, Engineering Technology, Health Professions, Kendall College of Art and Design, Michigan College of Optometry, Pharmacy, and the offices of Extended and International Operations as well as Retention and Student Success. These programs lead to doctorate, master, bachelor, and associate degrees, as well as certificates. Master's degrees are offered specifically in Business Administration, Career and Technical Education, Criminal Justice, Curriculum and Instruction, Educational Leadership, Fine Arts, Information Security and Intelligence, Nursing, and Social Work. Doctoral degrees offered at Ferris are in Community College Leadership, Nursing Practice, Optometry and Pharmacy.

Each college offers a cluster of related programs that are targeted to prepare students for specific careers, responsible citizenship, and lifelong learning.

#### **FINANCIAL AID**

More than 83% of the students presently enrolled in a degree-granting program at Ferris State University receive some type of financial aid through federal, state, institutional, private, and other sources including scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment. Ferris State University awards more than \$150 million in student aid annually.

Financial aid is primarily based on financial need and is intended to assist students whose families lack the total resources needed to pay for college. #### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### **ATHLETICS**

The Ferris State University Bulldogs are members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Varsity teams compete in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (NCAA Division I) in ice hockey and the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (NCAA Division II) in all other sports. Ferris student athletes participate in 17 varsity sports. Individual men and women teams are: golf, tennis, basketball, indoor and outdoor track, and cross country. Women may additionally participate in varsity: softball, soccer and volleyball. Men may participate in varsity: hockey and football.

#### **CENTER FOR LATIN@ STUDIES (CLS)**

The Center for Latin@ Studies helps students get to and through college by building on and celebrating their cultural identity. CLS is the home of the Promesa Pathways, which are composed of Promesa Avancemos, a middle school college and STEM career exploration program; Promesa Summer Success, an early summer college bridge program for rising high school juniors and seniors; Promesa Scholars, an academic leadership program focused on Latin@ student success using a culturally responsive pedagogy; and Amigos de Promesa Scholars, an internship readiness program partnered with CLACS and the West Michigan Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

#### **DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION OFFICE**

The Diversity and Inclusion Office works with the entire Ferris State University community to support the core values, mission, and vision of the University, and to ensure that diversity and inclusion, in their many forms, are understood, respected, and valued. The Diversity and Inclusion Office at Ferris State University guides efforts to conceptualize, assess, and cultivate diversity and inclusion as institutional and educational resources.

More specifically, the Diversity and Inclusion Office will:

- Be a strong advocate for diversity and inclusion;
- Introduce diversity into the systems, structures, and culture of the University;
- Provide expertise and leadership on diversity and inclusion related matters, for example, faculty recruitment and retention issues, and the educational impact of diversity;
- Lead University-wide diversity planning and implementation efforts, resulting in a collaborative vision of diversity and inclusion;
- Help develop policies to make the campus more welcoming and inclusive;
- Identify strategies to enhance the compositional diversity profile of students, faculty, and staff;
- Provide resources and direction for infusing diversity into the curriculum; and,
- Offer annual assessment of the University's progress toward implementing the Diversity and Inclusion Plan.

#### **ENTERTAINMENT UNLIMITED (EU)**

Entertainment Unlimited, the campus programming board, is made up of motivated students that have a general interest in entertainment and enjoy planning and implementing campus events. Events include guest speakers, comedy shows, films, novelties, and live music performances including the annual Music Takes Action benefit concert. EU is open to all students with some general membership requirements.

#### CENTER FOR LEADERSHIP, ACTIVITIES AND CAREER SERVICES (CLACS)

This department assists students in finding their fit at Ferris State while preparing for their future career by engaging them in activities and leadership development outside of the classroom. CLACS provides opportunities for students to put their skills to use while planning events, leading registered student organizations, volunteering their time to help the community, and attending a variety of conferences and workshops. The Center for Leadership, Activities and Career Services offers six distinct resource areas:

**Activities** - Provides a place to go when looking for things to do on campus. Multiple activities take place every day and the CLACS staff will help you find something you enjoy doing. Event planning assistance is available to all students to ensure a successful event. Homecoming, Bulldog Beginnings, Fridays at Ferris, Five Star speakers and more are coordinated through CLACS.

**Student Organizations** - Helps to keep students involved and connected to the University. There are more than 220 registered student organizations (RSOs), including club sports, Greek-letter organizations, spiritual groups, honor societies, student government, professional associations and more. Students can find a suitable or fitting organization themselves or they can learn how to start a new organization. Students can find out more about RSOs on Bulldog Connect, the student organization management platform.

**Fraternity & Sorority Life** - Embracing the long-held history and values of fraternities and sororities, this office works to empower Greek-letter organization members to continue the legacy to advance their missions. The office offers recruitment information, support with activities, and plans Greek Week and Hazing Prevention Week. At the core, fraternal membership offers an opportunity for leadership, scholarship, service, and building community.

**Leadership** - Helps students gain and use leadership skills through campus and community involvement. All students have access to a variety of leadership workshops, a leadership conference, LeaderShape Institute, and many RSO's to practice leadership. Students have access to Bulldog Connect, an internet-based software package that allows students to manage their achievements and student organization business. Bulldog Connect also allows students to create and produce a record transcript that displays proof of their leadership and activities outside of the classroom. The end of the year Torchbearer Awards Ceremony offers emerging and seasoned leaders' recognition for their efforts.

**Volunteering and Community Engagement** - Volunteer opportunities are shared with students who are seeking agencies to assist. Further community engagement experiences are offered to become civically engaged, raise money, or collect donations to meet community needs.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

**Career Services** - Assists students with career planning, career research, skills attainment, job search, document preparation, interviewing, internships and job postings for success in the workplace. Students/alumni have access to Handshake, which is a state-of-the-art internet-based software package that allows students to write résumés, post their résumé for employers to find, search and apply for employment/internship opportunities, and sign up for on-campus interviews and events. Career Fairs and on-campus interviewing opportunities bring over 350 employers on campus each semester.

#### **Corporate and Professional Development - (CPD)**

Corporate and Professional Development is the outreach of the Extended and International Operations that connects business and industry to the knowledge and resources of Ferris State University. CPD offers a wide range of services including customized training, applied research, test development, leadership development, and consulting. Since 1984, CPD has realized the vision of Woodbridge Ferris to serve society through the practical application of knowledge.

A technician's certification card with the Ferris State University logo, which they display each time they purchase refrigerant, is recognized and valued throughout the industry. The CCTT, through its state-of-the-art database, has the ability to administer testing programs for a wide variety of businesses. The CCTT offers:

As part of EIO, the Office of Graduate Studies is committed to supporting graduate students and programs across the University, drawing on expertise in serving adult learners and those who study at a distance. This support includes planning and central office support, coordinating growth in current programs, developing new degree options, market research and environmental scanning, marketing and recruitment, and supporting the online learning environment.

#### **Innovation Center**

Encouraging academic-driven innovation that supports the mission and strategic plan of Ferris State University is the purpose of the Innovation Center and its Innovation Development Grant. Innovative projects or initiatives supported include encouraging and facilitating innovative degree initiatives in emerging fields and promoting and advancing innovative experiences that blend theory and practice.

#### **Community College Leadership Doctoral Program (DCCL)**

The Ferris State University Doctorate in Community College Leadership (DCCL) empowers graduates to advance community colleges toward excellence and community responsiveness through exemplary leadership.

#### **Corporate and Professional Development (CPD)**

CPD connects corporations, government agencies, non-profits, and other organizations with the customized training they need to advance their industry or service areas. CPD unites faculty from multiple colleges to create a customized training solution using Ferris facilities, trainee workplaces, or other creative locations, moving today's workforce forward fast. CPD also manages Ferris summer camps' logistics, serving 2,000 kids annually – exposing them to the camp content and a future at Ferris.

#### FERRIS LIBRARY FOR INFORMATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND EDUCATION (FLITE)

FLITE opened on March 12, 2001, as a premier research facility integrating modern technology with traditional information resources. Designed for flexibility and versatility, FLITE continues to adapt to the advancing digital age. The library provides public computers, including a Mac Design Center of eight computers loaded with design software; wireless connectivity; seating for over 1,000 visitors; and individual and group study rooms. FLITE maintains an extended-hours study area during midterm and final exam periods and a family study room for visitors accompanied with children. Students using FLITE have access to laptop computers and scanners. An assistive-technologies laboratory facilitates the learning and research of students requiring special accommodations. New seating and study places that promote both collaborative and individual learning have revitalized FLITE's second floor and made it a popular study location on campus.

FLITE serves as a gateway to a variety of information resources available both on-site and off-campus in print and digital formats. FLITE houses a collection of more than 180,000 print volumes and provides access to 170+ online databases, reference resources, more than 300,000 electronic journals/newspapers/magazines, 14,000+ streaming videos, and over 200,000 eBooks. FLITE's SmartSearch service allows users to search for information from most of these collections through a single Google-like search box. FLITE is a Federal Depository Library for U.S. government documents and a Patent and Trademark Depository Library. The Library's online catalogs and digital resources are available through the FLITE website at <a href="http://www.ferris.edu/library/">http://www.ferris.edu/library/</a>. Interlibrary loan and document delivery services are offered to all faculty, staff, and students, including distance-education students, allowing users access to innumerable additional resources. Faculty, staff, and students can receive help using any library resource by phone, email, real-time chat, or SMS text. Individual research assistance is available upon request from subject-specialist librarians.

FLITE takes full advantage of advanced technologies to expand opportunities for teaching and learning. The library contains four instructional studios equipped with 20-30 computer stations, an instructor's workstation, sound and projection equipment, TV/VCR, and DVD player. All instructional studios are "smart classrooms" and include a docucam. Additional equipment such as laptop computers and wireless microphones are available upon request. The instructional studios allow librarians and other faculty to teach the information-seeking and critical-thinking skills necessary to evaluate information resources. The information literacy program starts with the basics in the form of an adventurous active-learning activity in the Ferris State University Seminar (FSUS) courses. The online tutorial PILOT (developed at FLITE) provides instruction in library use and research to classes upon request of instructors. Additionally, FLITE has seven seminar rooms of various sizes to accommodate library instruction classes, meetings, and professional development activities and a Music & Media Room is available for creation of audio/visual media and to use FLITE's vinyl record collection.

FLITE is also home to the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning, the Jim Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia, the Office of Multicultural Student Services, the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, and the Academic Literacies Center comprised of the University Writing Center and the Academic Support Center.

#### **HOUSING & RESIDENCE LIFE**

Living on campus has proven to foster student engagement and improve overall student success. Ferris State University on-campus housing provides an environment that is clean, comfortable, safe and conducive to supporting the academic mission of the University. More specifically, living in the residence halls enhances and completes the learning that occurs at the University.

Student growth is enhanced through exposure to other points of view, experiencing diverse populations, and learning to live interdependently in a community of peers. Living with others can help residents develop coping skills and experiment with responsible decision-making in a safe environment.

A variety of housing and dining options give students the opportunity to create the environment in which they feel most comfortable. Amenities include wired and wireless internet connections in each residence hall, a choice of double or single rooms, and many themed housing options. Cable television, available in every room, includes HD channels. Washers and dryers are located on virtually every floor. Mail is delivered to each residence hall and each hall is equipped to provide a home-like feel with items such as board games, large screen televisions, overstuffed furniture and hall-sponsored activities.

Living in the residence halls is an educational endeavor. Our staff provides social and educational programming aimed at building cohesive communities on each floor. While our hall staff is in place to assist in maintaining community standards, residents are reminded that maintaining community standards is a shared responsibility.

The apartment community at the University consists of the West Campus Apartments. The West Campus complex has 150 two-bedroom, 50 three-bedroom and 15 four-bedroom unfurnished townhouses that include a laundry facility in each apartment. They are designed to provide a neighborhood-like atmosphere for families and single students alike. Families with children living in campus apartments are encouraged to use the playground, basketball courts and various walking paths.

The East Campus Suites are neither residence halls nor apartments; rather this style of on-campus housing combines the best of both worlds. Each of the three 3-story buildings is home to 100 students. Exterior doors are locked 24/7 utilizing the same card swipe access and blue light/call box phone security system as our residence halls. Each building houses 24 four-bedroom suites and 2 two-bedroom suites. Every student has his or her own furnished bedroom and shares a full bathroom with one other student. A furnished living room and full kitchen complement the feeling of home each suite provides. With amenities such as air conditioning, garbage disposal, wireless connectivity, campus cable television, and more, the suites are sure to be a campus favorite for generations to come.

#### **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (IT SERVICES)**

The Information Technology Services (ITS) is responsible for planning, management, and direction of technology initiatives in support of both academic and administrative operations at Ferris. ITS department works collaboratively with members of the campus community in providing the technology services that directly align with the University's mission to prepare students for successful careers, responsible citizenship, and lifelong learning. ITS provides a diverse set of technology services including development, monitoring, and maintenance of the campus data network, telephone system, computer systems and servers, computer labs, smart classrooms and desktop and end-user computing. ITS department is comprised of 4 major units that provide a variety of services to the students, faculty, staff and Ferris affiliates. The IT Solution Center (previously known as TAC), Enterprise Application & Infrastructure Services, Network & Telecomm Services and Cyber Security units that are supported by IT Administrative/Central office which also includes IT Project Management.

The IT Solution Center (formerly known as TAC) is the first point of contact for all technology related assistance and support to students, faculty, staff, and University affiliates. Customers can contact the IT Solution Center via phone, chat, or the self-service portal hosted on Ferris IT site (<a href="www.ferris.edu/it">www.ferris.edu/it</a>). The site also hosts knowledge articles regarding the University standards for desktop computing like hardware, software applications and systems.

ITSC installs and manages the desktops and software packages across the University located in classrooms, computer labs, meeting areas, and faculty/staff offices. ITSC supports smart classrooms across the campus that have specialized audio/visual equipment to aid instruction; issues cell phones to faculty and staff upon departmental approval and supports cable television across Ferris. The service desk is the IT walk-up area located on the first level of the University Center. ITSC repairs personally owned computers at a nominal charge for students and employees. ITSC also participates in fall and spring classes start up through iConnect program to support students to start their classes.

Enterprise Application, & Infrastructure Services (EAIS) maintains and supports the enterprise servers and application infrastructure for the University. EAIS architects and configures approximately 200 servers ensuring timely and reliable access to enterprise computing resources. They maintain and manage the University data centers that host most of the enterprise applications, telecommunications and network servers. The primary enterprise applications include Banner, the University's records system; MyFSU, the campus portal system; Argos, the University's enterprise reporting tool; and FERRISGO, the University's mobile app. EAIS offers services focused on process automation to increase efficiencies in existing applications and ensure successful outcomes. EAIS also supports many hosted/cloud solutions used across the University and internally hosts the departmental applications.

The Network and Telecommunications team develops, installs, and supports the high-speed communications infrastructure for the University's computers and multi-media devices across the Ferris statewide network. They evaluate and invest in the appropriate hardware and software to provide wired and wireless network in assisting the campus community. Telecommunications also maintains phone and voice services for the University.

The IT Cyber Security team works with members of IT, leaders, and users throughout the Ferris community to ensure IT system security aligns with the goals of the University. The Cyber Security team is instrumental in the development, delivery and maintenance of information security systems to safeguard the University's data, information assets and the supporting infrastructure against unauthorized use, disclosure, modification, damage or loss utilizing Mobile Device Management and encryption. Our cyber security services include the implementation of IT security methods and remediation, monitoring of IT security related events, threat and vulnerability management, and security incident response services.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

IT Cyber Security promotes a safe and secure IT operational environment through assessment and hardening of systems. The team coordinates and communicates security related information to the University community and educates end users through various training opportunities. Ongoing assessments identify confidential, proprietary, and sensitive information resources to determine appropriate use and access, and to employ measures to protect the resources from unauthorized access and/or disclosure.

The IT Administrative/Central Office or the office of the CTO coordinates administrative operations for IT department. The office facilitates IT procurement for the University which includes hardware and software applications. The office also provides project management for University IT initiatives and coordinates technical and security reviews for all University software acquisitions.

#### **INTRAMURAL AND RECREATIONAL SPORTS**

Annually, more than 3,000 students participate in organized recreational sports activities, including extensive intramural and club sport programs. Other students participate in informal recreation activities. Ferris provides ample facilities for athletics and recreation, including a newly remodeled Student Recreation Center with pool, weight room, basketball and volleyball courts, and an indoor track. You can also find a golf course; a sports complex including full and half-size ice rinks, additional basketball and volleyball courts; racquetball courts and indoor and outdoor tennis courts on campus.

#### HISTORY OF KENDALL COLLEGE OF ART AND DESIGN

The roots of KCAD lead back to 1928 and Helen M. Kendall, the second wife of nationally known Grand Rapids furniture designer David Wolcott Kendall. In her will, Mrs. Kendall established the David Wolcott Kendall Memorial School to continue her husband's legacy of creativity, education, and innovation. The school opened its doors on March 1, 1931, with a total enrollment of 35 art students at 145 Fountain St., in an area known as Heritage Hill. The school outgrew this location and in 1961 established a new campus at 1110 College Ave. NE. In 1984 as enrollment continued to grow, the school expanded its program offerings and sought a larger campus location in the heart of downtown Grand Rapids at what is now 17 Fountain St.

In 1996, KCAD and Ferris State University embarked upon a four-year process of affiliation that culminated in a complete merger in the 2000-2001 academic year. The merger was attractive to both schools, offering a partnership of art, design, and technology that would optimize both schools' strengths, enhance educational offerings to students, and further expand Ferris' presence in Grand Rapids.

In the early 2000's, KCAD began the process of acquiring and renovating the Historic Federal Building at the corner of Pearl Street and Division Avenue in downtown Grand Rapids, but it wasn't until the fall of 2012 that the building's LEED-certified remodeling was revealed to the public. All the building's historical aesthetics were preserved, while the interior was outfitted to meet the demands of 21st century.

In the fall of 2013, KCAD finalized a merger with Urban Institute for Contemporary Arts [UICA] which has enabled both organizations to reach a broader audience through a unique synergy around contemporary art. The UICA not only supports curricular needs, but also engages the greater Grand Rapids community.

#### **OFFICE OF MULTICULTURAL STUDENT SERVICES**

The Office of Multicultural Student Services (OMSS) promotes the intellectual understanding and appreciation of diversity, inclusion and social justice by creating opportunities for learning and leadership development for the campus community. In addition, the office provides meaningful support to assist in the transition, retention, and graduation of underrepresented student populations.

As students matriculate through Ferris, the OMSS staff is committed to supporting students through five pillars of service:

**Advocacy** - OMSS makes every attempt to ensure that our students' college experiences are fair and as rewarding as possible by providing meaningful support.

**Leadership Development** - Through the T.O.W.E.R.S. Leadership Development Program, OMSS provides development opportunities for students to learn and develop important transferable skills that will assist them in becoming leaders on campus and in their future careers.

**Mentorship** - OMSS staff provides one-on-one guidance to students and organizations to encourage growth and development and to help them make healthy choices socially and academically.

**Cultural Awareness** - OMSS sponsors a variety of programs, guest speakers, and discussions to engage the campus community and facilitate student learning as it relates to multiculturalism and inclusion.

College Access - OMSS spreads awareness and creates a college-going culture to prospective middle and high school students through the federal and state funded MI GEAR UP/KCP College Day Program. OMSS coordinates many cultural awareness events throughout the year, listed are just a few: Conversations on Race, #NoType Campaign Against Stereotypes, Transitions to Success: Minority Freshmen Orientation, Cultural Connections Open House, Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration, Native American Heritage Month Celebration, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration, Black History Month Celebration, Women's History Month Celebration, Asian American History Month Celebration, OMSS Minority Graduate Recognition Program, T.O.W.E.R.S. Leadership Development Program, and Black Male Network Initiative.

#### OFFICE OF TRANSFER AND SECONDARY SCHOOL PARTNERSHIPS

The Office of Transfer and Secondary School Partnerships serves as a hub for collaborations between high schools, career and technical education centers, early/middle college programs, postsecondary institutions and Ferris State University. The Office promotes access to higher education and degree attainment by facilitating transfer partnerships and supporting transfer students through the Transfer Services Center and creates and manages high school partnerships and provides opportunities for high school students to earn college credit while still in high school through the FerrisNow Program. The Transfer Services Center coordinates academic transfer processes, assessment of prior learning, academic credit opportunities for veteran students, transfer guides, articulation agreements, reverse

transfer and serves as a resource for transfer and non-traditional students. The FerrisNow program oversees dual enrollment, concurrent enrollment, early/middle college and articulation agreements.

#### **RETENTION AND STUDENT SUCCESS**

Retention and Student Success (RSS) supports the academic experience providing services and resources to aid teaching, learning and timely progress to degree completion. RSS also collaboratively contributes to the institutional culture and programmatic efforts in support of students' transition and integration into the University community.

#### STUDENT AFFAIRS

The Division of Student Affairs is committed to creating a campus environment that promotes student learning and positive, healthy, and safe living experiences through our services and activities. This is accomplished through a variety of programs and services for students through the following areas: Admissions, Birkam Health Center, Commencement, Enrollment Services, Financial Aid, Institutional Research and Testing, LGBTQ+ Center, Office of Multicultural Student Services, Personal Counseling Center, Registrar's Office, Student Conduct, Student Employment, Student Life, Title IX Office, University Center, University Recreation, Veterans' Resource Center and the Vice President's Office. These areas contribute to the institution's mission of preparing students for leadership and involvement in an increasingly diverse, technologically sophisticated, and complex global society by offering a broad range of programs, activities, professional development and leadership opportunities.

#### STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The Student Employment Office is in the Timme Center for Student Services. Its goal is to assist students in finding part-time employment that will provide income while attending Ferris, as well as help them learn transitional skills that will benefit them upon graduation. There are over 2,000 student employees on campus every year. In addition to helping students find jobs on campus, Student Employment offers off-campus job postings for area businesses. The Office participates in the Federal Community Service Work Study Program that allows students to work in community-based positions in the area such as at the local food pantry, as a reading tutor for local students, or at the local recycling center. #### FERRIS BUILDINGS AND POINTS OF INTEREST

**Alumni Building** (1929) - The oldest building on campus and the only building to survive the fire in 1950, the Alumni Building houses the University Archives and Extended and International Operations, which administers Ferris Statewide, Ferris eLearning, Ferris Online, Corporate and Professional Development, Office of Graduate Studies, Innovation Center, and the Doctorate in Community College Leadership program. Classrooms and faculty offices for the College of Arts and Sciences are also in this building, as well as the office of Ferris State University TORCH student newspaper.

Arts and Sciences Commons (1996) - This building houses Arts and Sciences faculty and administrative offices, Retention & Student Success faculty and administrative offices, the Educational/Career Counseling and Disabilities Services offices, the Transfer Services Center, the Shimadzu Core Laboratory for Academic and Research Excellence, and the Card/Riley Wildlife Education Center. The building also features "The Visionary," a mural - one of the largest of its type in the world - depicting the history of FSU. The Arts and Sciences Commons structure connects the Science and Starr Buildings.

**Automotive Center** (1956) - The Automotive Center (formerly Trade and Industrial Center) comprises the instructional and lecture facilities for Automotive Services, Automotive Management and Automotive Engineering Technology.

**Birkam Health Center** (1959) - This building houses the Birkam Health Center as well as the Personal Counseling Center to provide a wide variety of health care and mental health services. It is also the home of the Office of Student Conduct and the Ferris Youth Initiative.

**Business Building** (1970) - The College of Business houses regular and team-based classrooms and computer labs (Mac, PC, Networking, Security, and Imaging & Media Production), as well as administrative and faculty offices. The facility also includes a recently renovated auditorium that accommodates more than 200.

**Creative Arts Center** (1965) - This building houses the studios, classrooms, and faculty offices needed for the Studio Arts in the College of Arts and Sciences.

**Ewigleben Sports Complex/Ice Arena** (1974) - This building is comprised of two indoor ice rinks and a recreational wing with facilities for intercollegiate hockey, recreational hockey and skating, basketball, and volleyball, all completed in 1975. An addition completed in 1981 includes fitness and sports medicine facilities and a volleyball arena. The Ice Arena underwent a \$3.3-million-dollar renovation project in the Summer of 2008. New piping and chiller system were installed, along with new concrete floors in both ice surfaces. Additionally, all new boards and tempered glass were added, along with upgrades to all of the locker rooms. The new "Bulldog Media/Meeting Room" was added in 2014.

Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education (FLITE) (2001) - Located in the heart of the main campus, FLITE features a variety of work and study spaces, including an information commons, four instructional studios, seven seminar rooms, 52 individual and group study rooms, a reading room, an extended-hours study area during midterm and final exam periods, and the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning (FCTL) Learn Lab, all with wireless access capability. The building has a total seating capacity of 1,300 with access to 172 computers. FLITE librarians teach instruction sessions at FLITE and in Ferris classrooms. Additionally, FLITE librarians bring library instruction to Ferris students around the state through face-to-face instruction and videoconferencing. FLITE is a U.S. Government Documents Depository, a Patent and Trademark Depository Library for Western Lower Michigan, and a depository for the U.S. Bureau of the Census. FLITE is the home to several other university departments including the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning, Media Production, the Office of Multicultural Student Services, the Jim Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia, the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, and the Academic Literacies Center comprised of the University Writing Center and the Academic Support Center.

**First Lady's Attic** (2009) - Ferris State University is committed to providing opportunities for its students, including the opportunity to get professional clothing for a class presentation, internship, or job interview at the First Lady's Attic, located in the University Center. Founded in 2009 by Patsy Eisler, the First Lady's Attic accepts professional clothing donations from alumni, staff, and community members. A Ferris student can pick up an outfit free of charge, and it is theirs to keep. The First Lady's Attic ensures that all Ferris students are dressed appropriately for success. The Diversity and Inclusion Office manages the Attic. For more information, please visit <a href="http://www.ferris.edu/flattic/">http://www.ferris.edu/flattic/</a>.

**G. Mennen Williams Auditorium** (1961) - This facility houses FSU's theater production area and serves as a major multipurpose auditorium for the FSU campus. With seating for 1,644, Williams Auditorium hosts musical, dramatic, cultural, and convocation events throughout the year. It also is available for public rental use when scheduling allows.

Granger Center for Construction and HVACR (2003) - The Granger Center for Construction and HVACR continues as a state-of-the-art facility - an interactive learning center where all structural steel, process piping, mechanical systems, and electrical systems are exposed and, where appropriate, accessible to students. The Center focuses on both theory and application. Its laboratory facilities provide a practical, "hands-on" experience using an extensive array of sophisticated up-to-date equipment devoted to testing and solving problems students are likely to encounter in the field.

Hagerman Pharmacy Building (1972) - Designed to support all on-campus operations of the College of Pharmacy; this building includes specialized instructional spaces, state-of-the-art Anderson Family Sterile Compounding Laboratory, 4-room simulation suite and the Rowe Pharmacy Care Clinic as well as a historical pharmacy exhibit.

Heavy Equipment Center (HEC) (1987) - This 53,000-square-foot building accommodates students in the 2- and 4-year Heavy Equipment Technology programs. The HEC building is the largest facility in the country dedicated to educating and training graduates for entry into the heavy equipment industry workforce. Additionally, it is home to the Heavy Equipment Service Engineering Technology B.S. Degree, the only one of its kind in the U.S.

Interdisciplinary Resource Center (IRC) (1969) (Renovated in 2007) - This building contains one large lecture hall seating 120, five classrooms with state-of-the-art teaching technology seating 30-50, television studios, the Center for Latin@ Studies, and the Office of International Education (which includes one computer classroom). The second-floor houses faculty from the College of Business. Connected to the College of Business building, the IRC also features an Erbert and Gerbert's Sandwich Shop in the heart of a comfortable area where students can gather, study and relax between classes.

Jim Crow Museum (2006) - The Jim Crow Museum is a national and international resource for individuals and groups interested in learning more about race, race relations, and racism. Located in the lower level of FLITE, the museum is this nation's largest publicly accessible collection of racial- and segregation-based artifacts. The museum is FREE to the public and features six exhibit areas—Who and What is Jim Crow, Jim Crow Violence, Jim Crow and Anti-Black Imagery, Battling Jim Crow Imagery, Attacking Jim Crow Segregation, and Beyond Jim Crow. The museum also offers a comprehensive timeline of the African American experience in the United States. The timeline is divided into sections: Africa before Slavery, Slavery in America, Reconstruction, Jim Crow, Civil Rights and Post Civil Rights.

Regular hours are Tuesday through Friday from 12-5 p.m. To schedule a group tour, call (231) 591-5873 or at <a href="mailto:jimcrowmuseum@ferris.edu">jimcrowmuseum@ferris.edu</a>. Please refer to the calendar of events for availability. Visitors to the Jim Crow Museum are prohibited from photographing or video recording any portions of the museum. Exceptions to this policy can be made at the sole discretion of museum staff and might include special events, scholars who have arranged in advance of their visits, and credentialed members of the press. Note: Because many of the museum's artifacts and media pieces contain explicit images of violence, nudity, offensive language, and other mature themes, the museum is recommended for those 12 years of age and older.

**Katke Golf Course** (1974) - This course offers 21 holes of championship golf. The original 18-hole course is a par 72 measuring 6,967 yards from the Black tees, 6,317 from the Crimson tees, 5,648 from the Silver tees and 4,752 from the Gold tees. Katke also features a "Family Tee" for juniors and new golfers. The D.O.G. Tee, or *Developing Original Golfers* Tee, allows new golfers the ability to play with more experienced players.

Katke's award-winning practice facility features three regulation holes (#19, #20 and #21), 100,000 square feet of natural grass teeing space, six target greens, a short game area for pitching, chipping, and bunker play, and multiple putting greens.

A new addition to Katke is the Ken Janke Sr. Golf Learning Center. The new facility provides a learning environment for students, members and guests, featuring four Trackman Simulators, three heated hitting bays for simulated golf and weekly league play. The facility will also feature an indoor practice green, state of the art club repair and fitting offerings, and will be home to the Michigan Golf Hall of Fame.

The Katke Clubhouse sits atop the highest point in Mecosta County with excellent views of the county to the west and of the FSU Campus to the east. The clubhouse provides full-service amenities including a fully stocked Golf Pro Shop, men's and women's locker rooms, Founders Grille, which features a variety of food and beverage options, and a Multi-Purpose Room with seating for up to 50 guests, perfect for business meetings or small parties.

PGA Professional Staff is available daily, providing all the needed services for golf-outing events, tournament needs, golf instruction and clinics, and custom club fitting. The golf course is conveniently located adjacent to the Holiday Inn Hotel and Conference Center.

McKessy House (1989) - McKessy House, resembling an Old English cottage on Cedar Street, north of Williams Auditorium, was purchased by Ferris State University in 1989 as a result of a generous gift from Gerald McKessy, a 1929 graduate of Ferris's college-preparatory program who went on to graduate from the Detroit College of Law in 1933. Mr. McKessy was a charter member of the President's Club, a Board of Directors of the Alumni Association, and a recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1971 for the generous donation of his time and talents to Ferris State University. Mr. McKessy donated stock, the proceeds of which were used to buy the house, storage barn, and two acres that are now utilized as parking and additional Arts and Sciences classroom space. Mr. McKessy's gift also made it possible to remodel the house, which is currently occupied by the Office of the Vice President and General Counsel. This division is responsible for legal affairs, equal opportunity, and labor relations.

Michigan Art Walk (1996) - The Michigan Art Walk is an ongoing project whereby original pieces of artwork created by Michigan artists are installed throughout campus and linked by a meandering pathway, ultimately reaching into the Big Rapids community. The inaugural sculpture of the Michigan Art Walk, by Ann Arbor-based artist Barron Naegel, was installed in the fall of 1996. Also installed in the fall of 1996 were a wall sculpture by Daniel Roache, under the auspices of the Presidential Art Collection, and the main panel of Robert Barnum's "The Visionary," which depicts the history of Ferris State University. The unveiling of "Escape," an outdoor sculpture by R. Farrington Sharp, on October 17, 1997 continued the project, along with the side panels of "The Visionary" which were unveiled on February 20, 1998, completing Barnum's triptych. "Totem Stack," a sculpture by Ferndale artist Albert Young, was unveiled on May 7, 1998. "Muse" by Irina A. Koukhanova, was dedicated on November 19, 1998, and sculptor Fritz Olsen's "Ripples" was unveiled November 19, 1999. Lois Teicher's functional piece, "Bench with Three Deep Seats," was dedicated on June 14, 2000. "Ferris Arch," a limestone sculpture by Kenneth Thompson, was dedicated October 10, 2001. Mark Chatterley's "Journey to the Body Collective," a flying wall sculpture located in the reading room at FLITE, was dedicated on October 29, 2002. Robert Barnum's "Of Thought and Reason," a 130-foot-long, 10-foot-tall painting on canvas located in FLITE's Extended Study Area was unveiled on August 28, 2003. Ray Katz's "Celebration," a large-scale metal sculpture, was unveiled September 3, 2004. The "TO STRIVE, TO SEEK, TO FIND" sculpture is dedicated to the 125th anniversary of FSU. The sculpture was created in a partnership between Ferris Fine Arts and the campus Welding Engineering Technology Program and was funded under the FSU Festival of the Arts. Important comments, quotes or sayings about Ferris are cut into the figure from support plates redefining viewer response and increasing level of content. The Art Walk pieces, along with information about the artists, can be viewed at https://ferris.edu/artwalk/homepage.htm.

Michigan College of Optometry (2011) - The program occupies a state-of-the-art 87,000 square foot building that was the University's first to earn Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certification. The first floor of the building is home to the University Eye Center, providing full-scope and specialty eye health, vision, and interdisciplinary care for patients from the community and around the state. The Dow Interactive Eye Learning Center on the third floor has 40 fully equipped examination lanes for students to learn and practice their skills as a future Doctor of Optometry. The classrooms and seminar rooms on the second floor contain modern, modular learning and study spaces.

Music Center (1962) - The Music Center is in the heart of the campus at the foot of the Carillon Clock Tower, between the FLITE Library and the Top Taggart Field football stadium. The Music Center features two large rehearsal rooms for several musical ensembles offered to students and community members. These musical groups include the Concert Band, Symphony Band, Summer Band, Pep Band, Jazz Band, Chamber Orchestra and Concert Choir. These large rehearsal rooms are also equipped with state-of-theart video and sound technology for instruction of a large variety of general education music courses offered to all students, such as Music Appreciation, American Pop Music, Music Fundamentals, Music and Culture, and Music in Film. There are also three practice rooms, each equipped with an acoustic piano, that are available to all students for individual and small group practice. There is also a keyboard lab, with 15 full-sized digital pianos, designed for beginning group piano classes. Most music faculty offices are also located in the Music Center.

National Elastomer Center for Plastics and Rubber Technology (1987) - The Ferris Plastics and Rubber program is the largest and most respected undergraduate program of its kind in the United States. The Plastics B.S. program was started in 1982 and continues to fill a great need in the growing plastics industry for technically trained personnel. Ferris graduates gain immediate status as recognized technical leaders. This innovative program provides students with a background that includes topics such as processing, material testing and properties, and mold and product design. Classes emphasize hands-on learning, using the same type of equipment that is currently used in the industry. The plastics building was expanded in 1998 and renamed the "National Elastomer Center" to include educational space for the new rubber degrees. The rubber program is a unique educational experience with graduates being sought after by the rubber industry. Coursework follows the original plastics degree in processing, testing, and design, but also includes rubber compounding. The plastics and rubber industry have shown support for the Ferris programs by sponsoring the construction of the Plastics Building in 1987 and the expansion in 1998 with funding for equipment and supplies, providing job experience by employing our students for summer internships and hiring our graduates.

**Presidential Art Collection** (1996) - Daniel Roache was chosen as the first contributor for a collection featuring commissioned works by Michigan artists honoring Ferris presidents. His aluminum, wall-mounted sculpture representing the seven (at that time) academic colleges hangs in the Williams Auditorium lobby. A bronze bust of President Byron Brophy by Midland sculptors James S. Hopfensperger and Joan Hopfensperger was dedicated on April 30, 1999. It is on display in the Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education (FLITE).

**Quad Café** (2015) - The Quad Café includes an All-You-Care-To-Eat Marché Style Dining where cooks prepare fresh foods in the Exhibition Style of cooking. The Quad Café offers a take-out option along with a variety of seating arrangements that include small individual areas as well as family-style seating, most with an outstanding view of the Robinson Quad. Located next to The Quad Café is the Grill Pit and the Snack Shack, a unique retail dining section with options that include the newest feature, the "Meal X-Change." The Meal X-Change allows meal plan participants the opportunity to use one of their unlimited meal swipes for a quick meal to go. Available within the retail section is a kiosk and online ordering app which allows patrons to order and pay for their selections in advance. Conferences, meetings, receptions, and banquets are all hosted and customized by the award-winning Catering Division which is also located in The Quad. For more details call: (231) 591-2605, or for Catering call: (231) 591-3685

Racquet Facility (acquired in 1980) - The facility offers four indoor hard tennis courts, ten outdoor hard courts, four 36' clay courts and fifteen 60' tennis courts (including one clay court) for junior players, two indoor racquetball courts/wallyball courts, cardiovascular and strength training equipment, free weights, fitness classes, functional training space, tennis lessons, clinics and league programs, rental equipment and a full-service tennis pro shop. This facility serves intercollegiate athletes, the club tennis team, faculty/staff, students, and the general public. It also includes a dry sauna in each locker room.

Rock Café (2008) - The Rock Café incorporates European-style marketplace décor where cooking aromas, product freshness, and abundance are prevalent. An emphasis is placed on food merchandising and includes casual café-style seating. Marketplace concepts also referred to as Marché Concepts or Food Emporiums, are the new generation in student dining. A marketplace concept provides an integrated food production and dining experience with an emphasis on fresh ingredients and made-to-order preparation. It is characterized by exhibition cooking at several distinct food platforms. Students today want an element of entertainment with their dining experience, a concept we call "Eatertainment." A marketplace concept offers this as the food becomes the "star" and the staff is on "stage."

**Science Building** (1956) (Remodeled and expanded in 1967 and completely renovated in 1997) - This building provides teaching auditoria, classrooms, and science laboratories for the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as the Rawlinson Observatory, John and Rhea Smith Greenhouse, and Reitz Reading Room.

**Starr Building** (1961) (Renovated in 1995, with frequent upgrades) - Students now enjoy state-of-the-art instructional equipment, multimedia labs, study rooms, and lounges. It is FSU's largest general classroom building and, in addition to the classrooms, houses the Museum of Sexist Objects.

**Student Convocation Center/Wink Arena** (1999) - This 42,000-square-foot facility, located adjacent to the Ewigleben Ice Arena, seats 2,400, and includes prime sections of chair-back seating. The building complex features an expanded lobby that adjoins the Ice Arena with a pro shop, concession stands, and a display for the Bulldog Hall of Fame. This center serves as the home for the FSU men and women's basketball programs and is used for commencement ceremonies, major concerts, and special events.

**Student Recreation Center** (1998) (Renovated in 2018) - The former HPE/Wink Arena building was remodeled and reopened August 30, 1998. The facility gives students, faculty, staff, and community members a modern gymnasium, weight room, aerobic rooms, exercise machines, elevated track, 40-foot climbing wall, and an indoor swimming pool.

**Swan Technical Center** (1966) (Completed renovation in 2018) - This building contains many classrooms and laboratories designed specifically for engineering and engineering-technology instruction. The building contains a large lecture hall in addition to the classrooms and laboratory spaces for the Welding, Manufacturing and Mechanical Engineering Technology programs.

Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) (1967) (Renovated 2002) - As the official "welcome center" for the University, the Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) serves as a one-stop service center in which students can register for classes, obtain financial aid and housing information, request transcripts, pay bills, and inquire about student employment opportunities. Highlights of Timme CSS include a glass atrium that extends the full height of the eastern side of the building and a second atrium facing State Street, providing natural sunlight and openness for the building. Formerly the campus library, the Timme CSS is a place of diversity, art, history and service. The first floor houses the Financial Aid, Student Financial Services, and Student Employment offices; the offices of Admissions, Registrars, Enrollment Services, Academic Senate, and Institutional Research are on the second floor. The third floor features a display of Ferris historical memorabilia, as well as houses the offices of the President, Provost & Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Student Affairs, Vice President for Diversity, Inclusion, and Strategic Initiatives, Budgetary Planning and Analysis, and Testing. The carefully chosen combination of offices and services provides a wonderful welcome to all constituents in the middle of campus.

The Early Learning Center (formerly Tot's Place) (1987) - The Early Learning Center is located on the first floor of Bishop Hall. The center is a nationally accredited educational learning center providing programs for children of FSU students, faculty, and staff. The Early Learning Center also serves as a laboratory setting which facilitates hands-on experiences for Ferris students preparing for future careers in education.

**University Center** (2015) - The University Center provides a wide variety of services and activities to meet the needs of students, faculty, staff and guests of the university. The center offers an updated any time dining service with a retail component, Starbucks Coffee Shop, Barnes & Noble Bookstore, Fine Arts Gallery, First Lady's Attic, several multi-purpose meeting rooms, a ballroom, commuter lounge and study lounge with computers and printing capabilities. Also, there are several lounges that provide comfortable areas for studying, relaxing and social engagement. Offices for student organizations include the Student Government of FSU, Entertainment Unlimited (programming board) and Veteran's Association. On the administrative side, the offices include the Dean of Student Life, Center for Leadership, Activities and Career Services, Catering Services, University Center, Veteran's Support, LGTBQ+ and TAC IT Solution Center.

**Victor F. Spathelf Center for Allied Health** (1979) - This four-level structure contains the specialized classrooms, laboratories, and offices for the students, faculty and administration of the College of Health Professions.





## PERCENT OF STUDENTS BY COLLEGE FALL SEMESTER 2021





#### **Hispanic or Latino:**

A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

#### International:

A person who is not a citizen of the United States, and who is in this country on a temporary basis and does not have a right to remain indefinitely.

#### **Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander:**

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Island.

#### White:

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.



### FALL TO FALL FIRST-YEAR RETENTION RATES (Full-Time FTIACS)





# **Driving Directions to Big Rapids Campus**

**Driving from East** (Detroit): Take I-96 West to Grand Rapids. Take US-131 North to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

**Driving from East** (Flint): Take I-69 West to Lansing. Take I-96 West to Grand Rapids. Take US-131 North to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

**Driving from East** (Mt. Pleasant): Take M-20 West to Big Rapids, turn south (left) on State Street. Follow State Street (which is Business Loop-131) and stay in the left lane. You will drive past Burger King (which is on your right). Turn left at the next stoplight (Perry Street), which is the main entrance to campus.

**Driving from North** (Cadillac): US-131 South to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn left and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

**Driving from North** (Old US-131): Continue on Old US-131 (which is State Street), stay in the left lane. You will drive past Burger King (which is on your right). Turn left at the next stoplight (Perry Street), which is the main entrance to campus.

**Driving from South** (Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo): US-131 North to Big Rapids, Exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.

**Driving from West:** Take M-20 East to Stanwood and then US-131 North to Big Rapids, exit 139. Turn right and follow Perry Street 1.7 miles to the last stop light which is State Street (Business Loop-131). Proceed straight through the stoplight into the main campus.





Financial Aid as a Percent of Total General Fund Spending FY 2020








Instructional Cost (Spending) per Student FY 2020




