HISTORY

Ferris State University is recognized for its career-focused majors that give our students the education they need to meet the needs of a changing economy. Founded in 1884 on the concept of providing students with marketable skills, Ferris was established by Woodbridge N. Ferris (1853-1928), a distinguished Michigan educator and politician who served two terms as the state's governor and was elected a United States Senator. Ferris was a private institute until 1950, when it joined the state higher education system. The college obtained university status in 1987.

LOCATION

The Ferris State University campus is located in Big Rapids, a west central Michigan city of approximately 10,700 in the vacation-recreation region. In addition to being home of Ferris State University, Big Rapids is the county seat of Mecosta County. The 880 acre campus is readily accessible by the US-131 expressway and state highway M-20. Big Rapids is 55 miles north of Grand Rapids and within 200 miles of Chicago and Detroit.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Ferris offers more than 170 educational programs through the Colleges of Allied Health Sciences, Arts and Sciences, Business, Education and Human Services, Engineering Technology, Pharmacy, Kendall College of Art and Design, Michigan College of Optometry at Ferris State University, College of Professional and Technological Studies, and University College. These offerings lead to bachelor and associate degrees and certificates. Master degrees in Information Systems Management, Career and Technical Education, Criminal Justice, Business Administration, Curriculum and Instruction, Nursing, and Fine Arts are available. Ferris also offers doctorate degrees in Optometry, Pharmacy and Community College Leadership.

Each college encompasses a cluster of related programs that are targeted to prepare students for specific careers, responsible citizenship and lifelong learning. The colleges operate in facilities that have been specially designed and equipped to support their missions.

Ferris is a national leader in the development of the concept of laddering, which enables students to advance their careers by building on previous training. For example, an individual who has gained employment after completing a two-year degree may later seek career advancement by returning to Ferris and earning a bachelor degree. This concept also permits students to transfer readily into Ferris programs.

ADMISSIONS

Current admission criteria for new students require all incoming freshmen students to submit ACT or SAT test scores along with official high school transcripts or official GED scores prior to an admission decision. Transfer students are required to submit official transcripts from all colleges attended as well as official high school transcripts and test scores, if required as prescribed by university standards, to achieve a complete academic profile. Students fulfilling both university and program entrance requirements will be granted admission.

ATHLETICS

The Ferris State University Bulldogs are members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Varsity teams compete in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (NCAA Division I) in ice hockey and the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (NCAA Division II) in all other sports. Ferris student athletes participate in 15 varsity sports: golf, tennis, basketball, track, cross-country, softball, soccer and volleyball for women; golf, tennis, basketball, track, cross-country, hockey and football for men.

CAMPUS MEDIA

Ferris offers students a variety of media, including a campus newspaper and local television cable system (Channel 22). *The Torch*, which is published weekly, informs students of University news, events, and other campus-related issues. FSU-TV Cable 22 serves the campus and community with educational and public service television programming. The *FYI* is an internal newsletter published weekly for faculty and staff with limited student distribution, and the *Crimson & Gold*, published three times yearly, is aimed at keeping alumni and other key audiences informed. Some of the colleges and programs on campus also publish their own alumni publications.

CAREER RESOURCES AT FSU

A Ferris State University career-oriented education is complemented by comprehensive educational planning and career counseling resources available from the Educational and Career Counseling Center (ECCC) which is staffed with licensed professional counselors. The ECCC is located on the 3rd floor of the Starr Building and provides a wide range of services for FSU students. EDUCATIONAL AND CAREER COUNSELING

Every undergraduate college has educational counselors to provide information on all of their academic programs in Ferris's undergraduate colleges. These counselors are located in the colleges of Allied Health Sciences, Arts and Sciences, Business, Education & Human Services, Engineering Technology and University College.

In addition to providing academic counseling, educational counselors in the Educational and Career Counseling Center (ECCC) located in STARR 313, help students to identify and overcome obstacles to their academic success through the identification of both learning preferences and an individual's approach to the college learning experience. ECCC also offers assistance in making career choices. While finding the right career depends on several factors, two strong influences are personality and interests. Students can receive information in these areas by completing the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator and the Strong Interest Inventory through the ECCC. A licensed counselor interprets the results with the student and provides information on careers that are aligned with the individual's personality, interests, values, and skills.

CAREER SERVICES

The Career Services Office is available to educate, guide, and support students/alumni, faculty/staff, and employers through-out the Career Development Process. Including, career planning, career research, skills attainment, job search document preparation, interviewing, internships, job postings, and success in the workplace.

Students/alumni have access to Bulldog Careerlink, which is a state-of-the-art internet-based software package that allows students to write resumes, upload their resumes into the FSU Resume Book database, search and apply for employment/internship opportunities and sign up for on-campus interviews and events. On-campus interviews take place both fall and spring semesters with approximately 120 employers participating per academic year.

Career Services takes part in many campus activities and holds many workshop sessions on a variety of job search techniques, all of which teach students at every academic level how to transfer their in and out of classroom experiences to the work world.

We coordinate three large events per year: Every fall and spring the Career Services office sponsors a general job fair to assist students in connecting with employers who are hiring interns and full-time employees. These job fairs consistently bring 120+ employers to campus. Every fall Career Services and Student Leadership and Activities coordinates a Professional Career and Leadership Conference; bringing in a variety of presenters and keynote speakers to discuss the impact of leadership upon career success.

FINANCIAL AID

More than 77 percent of the students presently enrolled at Ferris State receive some type of financial aid through Federal, State, Institutional, Private and Other sources including scholarships, grants, loans and student employment. Ferris State University awards more than \$167 million in student aid annually.

Financial aid is primarily based on financial need and is intended to assist students whose families lack the total resources needed to pay for college. COLLEGE OF PROFESSIONAL AND TECHNOLOGICAL STUDIES

In the early 1970s, Ferris State University opened the Office of Continuing Education on the Big Rapids, MI campus. At that time, the office focused on the development and delivery of non-credit, continuing education programs, institutes, and camps. In the late 1970s, the offering of degree programming was added to its operation and the first off-campus location was opened in Traverse City, MI.

In 1983 the unit was reorganized as the Gerholz Institute for Lifelong Learning (GILL) and then changed again in 1998 to the University Center for Extended Learning (UCEL). Other early off-campus sites included Dowagiac in 1978 and Grand Rapids that began operation in the early 1980s. The Grand Rapids location, dubbed Ferris-Grand Rapids, operated as a standalone campus and, for a short time in the late 1990s, oversaw the operations of the Dowagiac, Jackson, and Muskegon sites before oversight for those locations reverted back to UCEL.

In 1999, the College of Professional and Technological Studies (CPTS) was established on the Grand Rapids campus with the mission to serve the area through the development and delivery of academic programs that met the specific needs of that area's business, industry and the community at large.

In 2007, CPTS and UCEL operations merged to bring cohesion and economy to the operations that serve the needs of more than 5,000 off-campus and online students each year.

Today, CPTS delivers more than 50 career-focused professional development certificates, associate, bachelor, and master degrees through a network of 16 locations - all aimed toward helping students advance toward their career goals. Students, many of whom are working adults, find earning their degree convenient with classes that fit within their busy schedules. Programs are offered in direct response to needs identified in communities throughout the state, often in partnership with the local community college.

In addition to academic programming, CPTS operates the Conference and Professional Services (CPS) office. The CPS team provides conference design and development consultation services that include planning, strategy, and implementation. To help ensure that programs succeed, they assist with marketing and promotion, financial management, contracts, registration, site selection, facilities arrangements, on-site services, and evaluations.

CPD

Ferris State University's Corporate & Professional Development (CPD) has been involved in partnerships to help businesses and industries with solutions to training, certification, custom assessment & gap analysis, product development, grant services, and consulting/applied research needs since 1984. More than 2,000 companies have taken advantage of the skills and facilities offered for training or testing, and over 150,000 participants in over 1,000 offered titles/projects have been served. CPD is known for its ability to partner with business and industry clients, associations, and other providers to tackle issues related to custom training, process consulting, product development, certification, and assessment. Training can be delivered at the main campus complex in Big Rapids, the Grand Rapids Campus, any of Ferris' Regional Centers, at the company's plant site, or company selected offsite. Training on hundreds of technical, safety & health, business, science, and supervision/leadership topics can be provided. Training may also involve participant assessment, certification through the Center for Certification Training and Testing, CEU's, and credit conversion as required.

CCTT

The Center for Certification Training & Testing was founded in the early 90's to administer the EPA mandated Section 608 certification and testing program to HVACR technicians throughout the entire country. The Institute has over a fourteen hundred registered proctors across the country and since its inception has certified over 400,000 technicians. These technicians carry certification cards with the Ferris State University logo which they display in supply houses all over the United States each time they purchase refrigerant. The visual presentation provided each time one of these cards is presented keeps the Ferris State University name highly recognizable and in the forefront throughout our industry. The CCTT through its state of the art database adds the ability to administer testing programs for a wide variety of business as well as handling their customer service, order fulfillment, warehousing and distribution needs.

With changing world needs, CPD & CCTT are investing in new offerings for the community it serves through an Energy Center & Annual Michigan Energy Conference, as well as activities in product innovation and entrepreneurship. CPD has invested in the future of training by creating the ability for development of computer interactive training for business and industry (custom CD-ROM, interactive television or internet delivery as well as traditional lecture and application labs). CPD can also assist businesses, industries, and individuals in the development and refinement of new product/process ideas. Third-party validation studies can be performed to prove client claims on their products.

The Ferris Art Gallery features exhibits of paintings, prints, photography, sculpture and crafts, as well as special exhibits featuring leading Michigan artists, FSU faculty and students.

The Arts and Lectures Committee offers a schedule of lectures, concerts and films, while Entertainment Unlimited and the Music Industry Management Association present pop/rock and comedy concerts and other events of a contemporary nature.

The Office of International Affairs "International Festival of Cultures" brings the world to Big Rapids with students, faculty, staff, and community members presenting cultural displays, performances, and food from more than fifty countries worldwide.

Entertainment Unlimited, the campus programming board, is responsible for coordinating more than 30 student-produced events each year including comedy shows, films, novelties and live contemporary music performances. Entertainment Unlimited also programs the Student Speaker Series which brings 6-8 speakers to campus each year. The Music Industry Management Association helps students get experience behind the scenes of producing live campus entertainment through their annual Autumn Alive Concert and Delta Chi Fraternity does the same with their annual January Jams Concert.

DISABILITIES SERVICES

Disabilities Services serves and advocates for students with disabilities, empowering them for self-reliance and independence while promoting equal access to educational opportunities and programs. FERRIS LIBRARY FOR INFORMATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND EDUCATION (FLITE)

FLITE opened on March 12, 2001, as a premier research facility integrating modern technology with traditional information resources. Designed for flexibility and versatility, FLITE continues to adapt to the world's advancing digital age. The Library houses 195 public computers (185 PCs and ten Macs, which includes a Mac Design Center of eight computers loaded with design software), approximately 1,000 ports to accommodate laptop access and future expansion, wireless connectivity, seating for 1,300 visitors, and 54 individual and group study rooms. Among its customer-service-oriented attributes, FLITE contains an extended-hours study area, a family study room for visitors accompanied by children, and a food court with vended beverages and snacks. Students using FLITE have access to laptop computers and scanners. An adaptive technologies laboratory facilitates the learning and research of students requiring special accommodations.

FLITE serves as a gateway to a variety of information resources available both on-site and off-campus in print and digital formats. FLITE houses a collection of more than 350,000 volumes and provides access to online databases, reference resources, and more than 45,000 electronic journals, newspapers, and magazines. FLITE is a Federal Depository Library for U.S. Government Documents and a Patent and Trademark Depository Library. The Library's online catalogs and digital resources are available through the FLITE Website at http://www.ferris.edu/library/. Interlibrary loan and document delivery services are offered to all faculty, staff, and students, including distance-education students, allowing users access to an immeasurable number of additional resources. Faculty, staff, and students can receive help using these resources by phone, email, or real-time chat reference service, submitting electronic forms via the Website, or in-person at the Reference Desk in FLITE. Students and faculty can also request reference and research assistance from subject specialist librarians. Faculty can also search and reserve titles in the "Media Booking" collection, which includes media resources for in-classroom use.

FLITE takes full advantage of advanced technologies to expand opportunities for teaching and learning. The Library contains four instructional studios equipped with 20 to 30 computer stations, an instructor's workstation, sound and projection equipment, TV/VCR, and DVD. All instructional studios are "smart classrooms" and include a docucam. Additional equipment such as smart boards, laptop computers, and wireless microphones are available upon request. The instructional studios allow librarians and other faculty to teach the information seeking and critical thinking skills necessary to evaluate information resources. The information literacy program starts with the basics in the Ferris State University Seminar (FSUS) courses and provides instruction in library use and research to classes upon request of instructors. In addition to instructional studios, FLITE also contains six seminar rooms of various sizes to accommodate library instruction classes, meetings, and professional development activities.

The FSU Media Production Center is a part of FLITE. The mission of Media Production is to provide assistance to faculty, staff, and students in the design, development, implementation, and distribution of media-related resources in support of Ferris instruction and activities. Activities range from videography to graphic design and production to creating DVDs from slide collections. FLITE also houses the Office of International Education and the Office for Multicultural Student Services.

HOUSING

Living on campus has proven to foster better student success. Ferris State University on-campus housing provides environments that are clean, comfortable, safe and conducive to supporting the academic mission of the University. More specifically, living in the residence halls enhances and completes the learning that occurs at the University.

Student's growth is further enhanced through exposure to other points of view, experiencing diverse populations and living in a community of peers. Living with others helps residents learn coping skills and experiment with responsible decision-making in a safe environment.

A variety of housing and dining options exists to allow students the opportunity to create the environment in which they feel most comfortable. Amenities include internet connections in each residence hall room, a choice of private or double rooms, health, wellness and substance-free living, the first-year experience and many other themed housing opportunities. Cable television, available in every room, includes HD and movie channels. Washers and dryers are located on virtually every floor, mail is delivered to each residence hall and residence halls are equipped to provide a feel of home with such items as board games, large screen televisions, overstuffed furniture and hall-sponsored activities.

Living in the residence halls is an educational endeavor. Staff provide social and educational programming aimed at building cohesive communities on each floor. While hall staff are in place to assist in maintaining community standards residents are reminded that maintaining community standards is a shared responsibility.

The University apartment community consists of the west campus townhouses and the south campus apartment complexes. The west campus complex has 150 two-bedroom and 50 three-bedroom unfurnished townhouses which are designed to provide a neighborhood atmosphere for families and groups of single students alike.

The south campus apartment complex consists of 88 traditional one-and two-bedroom units. They are designed for single students and have laundry facilities in each building.

The East Campus Suites are neither residence halls nor apartments. Rather, this new style of on-campus housing combines the best of both worlds. Each of the three 3-story buildings are home to 100 students. Exterior doors are locked 24/7 utilizing the same card swipe access and blue light/call box phone security system as our residence halls. Each building houses 24 4-bedroom suites and 2 2-bedroom suites. Every student has their own furnished bedroom and shares a full bathroom with one other student. A furnished living room and full kitchen compliment the feeling of home each suite provides. With amenities such as air conditioning, garbage disposal, wired and wireless connectivity, campus cable television and more, the suites are sure to be a campus favorite for generations to come.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

The Information Technology Services (ITS) department takes care of the computing needs of the University community. The Technology Assistance Center (TAC) is the first point of contact for students, faculty, staff and others associated with the University to get computer help. Customers can contact TAC via phone, chat, or email; or look for answers on University standard hardware, software, and systems on our web site (www.ferris.edu/techsupport). The TAC handles approximately 36,000 contacts a year.

To support the educational process, the ITS manages the software and hardware on roughly 4,200 university-owned computer stations in located in classrooms, public access labs, and faculty/staff offices. Many of the classrooms also have specialized equipment to aid instruction such as digital projectors, student feedback systems ("clickers"), and multimedia playback and recording systems.

Information Technology Services maintains over 250 servers to run the business of the University community. The main systems include FerrisConnect, the on-line learning/course management system; MyFSU, the campus portal system; and Banner, the University records system. FerrisConnect hosts fully online courses for students all over the world, and provides the tools to enhance student learning and assessment for many on-campus courses as well. FerrisConnect use continues to grow, with the student credit hour (SCH) production reaching 10,923 hours in the Spring of 2010.

Computers all across campus can access the Internet and other University services via the high-speed network. Wired and/or wireless access is available in most places on campus, with each of the 3,000 residence hall rooms and campus apartment having at least one wired network jack. ITS also maintains the cable, emergency management, and phone services for the University.

Students, faculty and staff can get repairs on their personally owned computers for a nominal charge, and purchase select Microsoft, Adobe, and AutoCAD titles for personal use at significantly reduced prices through Student Technology Services department, located in the West building. Students can have their computers set up to connect to the network for no charge at the start of fall semester via the iConnect program.

INTRAMURAL AND RECREATIONAL SPORTS

Annually, more than half of the student body participates in organized recreational sports activities, including extensive intramural and club sport programs. Other students participate in informal recreation activities. Ferris provides ample facilities for athletics and recreation, including a Student Recreation Center with pool, weight room, basketball and volleyball courts and indoor track; a golf course; a sports complex including full-and half-size ice rinks, additional basketball and volleyball courts; racquetball courts and indoor and outdoor tennis courts.

KENDALL COLLEGE OF ART AND DESIGN OF FERRIS STATE UNIVERSITY

Kendall College of Art and Design began in 1928 through a generous endowment provided by Helen M. Kendall as a memorial to her husband, David Wolcott Kendall, known as the Dean of American Furniture Designers. Helen Kendall envisioned a school whose graduates would be leaders in the world of art and design, and throughout history, Kendall College of Art and Design has prepared generations of students for careers as professional artists and designers. In addition, Kendall College of Art and Design is an active partner with the community, annually providing more than 2,000 children and adults with the opportunity to pursue courses in art and design through one of the richest and most varied continuing studies programs in the United States.

In 1996, the Board of Trustees of Kendall College of Art and Design voted to merge Kendall with Ferris State University, a process that was completed in December 2000. In combining these two distinctive institutions, the Boards of both Kendall and Ferris have forged a union that offers students the educational opportunities and strengths of each institution.

The mission of Kendall College of Art and Design of Ferris State University is to educate its students to be leaders in the arts by nurturing creative and intellectual excellence, to promote in its students an awareness of social responsibility, to provide a dynamic professional environment, to move the institution toward national prominence, and to support institutional integrity through resource development.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

The division of Student Affairs provides a variety of services for students through the following departments: Birkam Health Center, Career Services, Counseling Center, Enrollment Services, Office of Multi-Cultural Student Services, Rankin Student Center, Student Leadership & Activities, Student Conduct, Student Life, and University Recreation. All of these departments work with students to enhance their university experience.

The Office of Student Leadership & Activities helps students use and grow their talents through campus and community involvement. To keep students involved and connected to the University, there are more than 200 registered student organizations (RSOs), including sports clubs, Greek-letter organizations, spiritual groups, academic societies and professional associations. The Student Volunteer Center refers hundreds of Ferris students each year to area agencies seeking volunteers. A variety of leadership programs are offered throughout the year to help students develop marketable leadership and management skills.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The Student Employment Office is located in the Timme Center for Student Services. Our goal is to assist students in finding part time employment that will provide income while attending Ferris as well as help them learn transitional skills that will benefit them upon graduation. There are approximately 2,400 student employees on campus every year. In addition to helping students find jobs on campus we offer off campus job postings for area businesses. We participate in the Federal Community Service Work Study program that allows students to work in community based positions in the area such as the local food pantry, working as a reading tutor for local students, or the local recycling center. Students may also sign up for the Quick Cash program that puts them in touch with local residents who are looking to hire students for odd jobs such as yard work, painting, etc. More information on Student Employment can be found on our web page

POINTS OF INTEREST

Alumni Building (1929) - The oldest building on campus and the only building to survive the fire in 1950. It houses the College of Professional and Technological Studies, Conference and Professional Services, and University Archives. Classrooms and faculty offices for the College of Arts and Sciences are also in this building.

Arts and Sciences Commons (1996) - houses Arts and Sciences faculty and administrative offices, University College faculty and administrative offices, the Academic Support Center, the Card Wildlife Education Center, the Math Science Technology Center, and features "The Visionary," a mural - one of the largest of its type in the world - depicting the history of FSU, and the Writing Center which provides peer tutoring to assist students with writing and study skills. This building connects the Science and Starr Buildings.

Automotive Center (former Technical and Applied Arts Center) (1956) - Comprises the instructional and lecture facilities for Automotive Services, Automotive Management and Automotive Engineering Technology.

Bishop Hall/College of Education (1967) - Built as a residence hall, it was remodeled in 1986 to house the College of Education & Human Services administrative offices and classrooms. Tot's Place is also located in Bishop.

Business Building (1970) - The College of Business houses classrooms and computer labs (Mac, PC, and Networking), as well as administrative and faculty offices. The facility also includes an auditorium that accommodates in excess of 200.

Creative Arts Center (1965) - This building houses the studios, classrooms, and faculty offices needed for the Studio Arts in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Ewigleben Sports Complex/Ice Arena (1974) - Comprises two indoor ice rinks and a recreational wing with facilities for intercollegiate hockey, recreational hockey and skating, basketball, and volleyball, all completed in 1975. An addition completed in 1981 includes a combative room, fitness and sports medicine facilities and a mini-arena.

Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education (FLITE) (2001) - Located in the heart of the main campus, FLITE features a variety of work and study spaces, including an information commons, 4 instructional studios, 6 seminar rooms, 54 individual and group study rooms, a reading room, and an extended hours study area, all with wireless access capability. FLITE has a total seating capacity of 1,300, more than 350,000 total volumes (books and periodicals), and 195 public computers. The FLITE webpage provides access to a broad collection of electronic databases, documents, books and journals. FLITE is a U.S. Government Documents Depository, a Patent and Trademark Depository Library for western lower Michigan, and a depository for the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The FSU Media Production Center is part of FLITE. FLITE also houses the Office of International Education and the Office for Multicultural Student Services.

G. Mennen Williams Auditorium (1961) - This facility houses FSU's theater program and also serves as the major multipurpose auditorium for the FSU campus. With seating for 1,644, Williams Auditorium hosts musical, dramatic, cultural, and convocation events throughout the year. It also is available for public rental use when scheduling allows.

Granger Center for Construction & HVACR - The Granger Center for Construction and HVACR is a state-of-the-art facility - an interactive learning center where all structural steel, process piping, mechanical systems, and electrical systems are exposed or visible behind glass. The Center focuses on both theory and application. Its laboratory facilities provide a practical, "hands-on" experience using an extensive array of sophisticated up-to-date equipment devoted to testing and solving problems students are likely to encounter in the field.

Heavy Equipment Center (1987) - A 53,000-square-foot building accommodating students in the 2 and 4-year heavy equipment technology programs. The HEC building is the largest facility in the country dedicated to educate and train graduates for entry into the heavy equipment industry workforce; additionally, it is home to the Heavy Equipment Service Engineering Technology B.S. Degree, the only one of its kind in the US.

Holiday Inn Hotel and Conference Center (1993) - The facility is located adjacent to the Katke Golf Course and overlooks the campus. The complex houses 16,772 square feet of meeting facilities, 118 guest rooms, banquet facilities and a restaurant. The conference facilities are used for continuing education activities, conferences and workshops.

Interdisciplinary Resource Center (1969) - Contains one large lecture hall seating 120, six classrooms with state of the art teaching technology seating 30-50, television studios, and the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning office suite that includes two computer training rooms. The second floor houses faculty from the College of Business.

Katke Golf Course (est. 1974) - Katke is a full service 18-hole championship golf course that measures 6,847 yards (slope rating 141 / 73.7) from the Bulldog tees, 6,333 (slope rating 138 / 71.2) from the Crimson tees, 5,891 (slope rating 135 / 69.0) from the Silver tees and 4,966 (slope rating 115 / 68.9) from the Gold tees.

The state-of-the-art practice facility includes 100,000 square feet of grass teeing space, six target greens, a large short game area that includes a chipping area and bunker for greenside or fairway bunker shots and 2 practice greens with over 15,000 square feet of space. The practice facility is encompassed by a 3-hole practice course that includes two par 4's measuring 325 yards each and a 150 yard par 3.

Our full service clubhouse sits atop the highest point in Mecosta County with excellent views back to campus. The clubhouse facilities include the Founders Grille Restaurant which features a wide variety food and beverage options; a 1,000 square foot multi-purpose room that holds up to 75 people for meetings or small parties; men's and women's locker rooms and a golf shop stocked complete with all of your golfing needs.

A staff of PGA Golf Professionals is available to provide tournament services, golf clinics, private video lessons and club fittings by appointment. The golf course is conveniently located adjacent to the Holiday Inn Hotel and Conference Center on the far west point of campus.

McKessy House (1989) - McKessy House, resembling an Old English cottage on Cedar Street, north of Williams Auditorium, was purchased by Ferris State University in 1989 as a result of a generous gift from Gerald McKessy, a 1929 graduate of Ferris' college preparatory program who went on to graduate from the Detroit College of Law in 1933. Mr. McKessy was a Charter Member of the Presidents' Club, a member of the Phoenix Society, a founding father of the Alumni Foundation, a 12-year member of the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association and a recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1971 for the generous donation of his time and talents to Ferris State University. Mr. McKessy donated stock, the proceeds of which were used to buy the house, barn and two acres that is now utilized as parking and additional Arts and Sciences classroom space. Mr. McKessy's gift also made it possible to remodel the house which is currently occupied by the Division of Governmental Relations and General Counsel. This division is responsible for governmental and community relations, legal affairs, equal opportunity, and labor relations.

Michigan Art Walk (1996) - The Michigan Art Walk is an ongoing project whereby original pieces of art work created by Michigan artists are installed throughout campus and linked by a meandering pathway, ultimately reaching into the Big Rapids community. The inaugural sculpture of the Michigan Art Walk, by Ann Arbor-based artist Barron Naegel, was installed in the fall of 1996. Also installed in the fall of 1996 were a wall sculpture by Daniel Roache, under the auspices of the Presidential Art Collection, and the main panel of Robert Barnum's "The Visionary," which depicts the history of Ferris State University. The unveiling of "Escape," an outdoor sculpture by R. Farrington Sharp, on October 17, 1997 continued the project, along with the side panels of "The Visionary" which were unveiled on February 20, 1998, completing Barnum's triptych. "Totem Stack," a sculpture by Ferndale artist Albert Young, was unveiled on May 7, 1998. "Muse" by Irina A. Koukhanova, was dedicated on November 19, 1998, and sculptor Fritz Olsen's "Ripples" was unveiled November 19, 1999. Lois Teicher's functional piece, "Bench With Three Deep Seats," was dedicated on June 14, 2000. "Ferris Arch," a limestone sculpture by Kenneth Thompson, was dedicated October 10, 2001. Mark Chatterley's "Journey to the Body Collective", a flying wall sculpture located in the reading room at FLITE, was dedicated on October 29, 2002. Robert Barnum's "Of Thought and Reason," a 130-foot-long, 10-foot-tall painting on canvas located in FLITE's Extended Study Area was unveiled on August 28, 2003. Ray Katz' "Celebration," a large-scale metal sculpture, was unveiled September 3, 2004. The Art Walk pieces can be viewed on the Ferris website along with information about the artists.

Music Center (1962) - The Music Center is located at the heart of the campus at the foot of the Carillon Clock Tower on the south end of the quad "green space" and just north of Top Taggart Field (football stadium). This facility offers rehearsal and practice space for all varieties of ensembles. The band room can accommodate groups of up to 100 musicians and the Choral Room provides room for 60 musicians. Private practice rooms are available and are ideal for individual practice or small groups of 2-3 persons. Each practice room contains an acoustic piano. The Humanities Department maintains these instruments (regular tuning, etc.) as a service to currently enrolled students. The piano lab has 12 stations (full-size keyboards) which are used for group instruction and practice for those enrolled in music classes. The music faculty and ensemble director's offices are also in the Music Center.

National Elastomer Center for Plastics and Rubber Technology (1987) - The Ferris Plastics and Rubber program is the largest and most respected undergraduate program in the United States. The Plastics B.S. program was started in 1982 and continues to fill a great need in the growing plastics industry for technically trained personnel. Ferris graduates gain immediate status as recognized technical leaders. This innovative program provides students with a background that includes topics such as processing, material testing and properties, and mold and product design. Classes emphasize hands-on learning, using the same type of equipment that is currently used in industry. The Plastics building was expanded in 1998, and renamed the "National Elastomer Center" to include educational space for the new Rubber degrees. The Rubber program is a unique educational experience with graduates being sought after by the rubber industry. Coursework follows the original plastics degree in processing, testing, and design but also includes rubber compounding. The plastics and rubber industry has shown support for the Ferris programs by sponsoring the construction of the Plastics Building in 1987 and the expansion in 1998 with funding for equipment and supplies, providing job experience by employing our students for summer internships and finally hiring our graduates.

Pennock Hall/Michigan College of Optometry (1968) - Built as a residence hall, it was adapted in 1977 to serve as the home for the Michigan College of Optometry at FSU and the University Eye Center. Starting in December of 2010, they will be moving to a newly constructed Michigan College of Optometry Building.

Pharmacy Building (1972) - Designed to house all on-campus operations of the College of Pharmacy, including specialized laboratories and the model pharmacy, and also contains an antique pharmacy exhibit.

Presidential Art Collection (1996) - Daniel Roache was chosen as the first contributor for a collection featuring commissioned works by Michigan artists honoring Ferris presidents. His aluminum, wall-mounted sculpture representing the seven academic colleges hangs in the Williams Auditorium lobby. A bronze bust of President Byron Brophy by Midland sculptors James S. Hopfensperger and Joan Hopfensperger-Most was dedicated on April 30, 1999. It is on display in the Ferris Library for Information, Technology, and Education (FLITE).

Racquet Facility (acquired in 1980) - The facility offers 4 indoor tennis courts, 10 outdoor hard courts, 2 outdoor clay courts, 3 indoor racquetball courts, cardiovascular and free-weight equipment, aerobic and fitness classes, tanning booths, tennis lesson programs, interactive Sportwall, rental equipment and a full-service tennis pro shop. This facility serves intramural and intercollegiate athletes, club tennis team, faculty/staff, students, the general public and as a laboratory for the Professional Tennis Management program.

Rankin Center (1957) - considered the "campus living room," is the center of student campus activities. The Student Center provides a wide variety of services and activities to meet the interest and needs of students, faculty, staff and guests of the University. Among the activities available are billiards, table tennis, and video games. Also offered are a television lounge, computers, information center, Seattle's Best Coffee Shop, Quizno's Subs, Westview Student Dining, James L. Lundberg Bookstore, fine arts gallery, First Lady's Attic, and a variety of conference rooms. Offices for student organizations include The Student Government of FSU, Entertainment Unlimited (programming board), S.E.R.V. - Veteran's Association, and The Torch (student newspaper). On the administrative side, there are offices for Student Affairs, Student Conduct, Career Services, Dean of Students, Residential Life, Student Activities, Catering Services, and the Student Center.

Science Building (1956) - Remodeled and expanded in 1967, completely renovated in 1997, this building provides teaching auditoria, classrooms, and science laboratories for the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as the Rawlinson Observatory, John and Rhea Smith Greenhouse, and Reitz Reading Room.

Starr Building (1961) - Completely renovated in 1995, students now enjoy new furnishings, state-of-the-art instructional equipment, multimedia labs, study rooms and lounges. It is FSU's largest general classroom building and houses the Educational Counseling and Disabilities Services office; Williams Auditorium, where dozens of live performances and special events are offered each year; and The Jim Crow Museum, a privately donated collection of American racist memorabilia artifacts.

Student Convocation Center/Wink Arena (1999) - This 42,000 square foot facility, located adjacent to the Ewigleben Ice Arena, seats 2,400, including prime sections of chair-back seating. The building complex features an expanded lobby that adjoins the Ice Arena with a pro shop, concession stands, and a display for the Bulldog Hall of Fame. This new center serves as the home for the FSU men's and women's basketball programs, and is also used for commencement exercises, major concerts, and special events.

Student Recreational Center (1998) - The former HPE/Wink Arena building was remodeled and reopened August 30, 1998. The facility gives students, faculty, staff, and community members a modern gymnasium, weight room, aerobic room, exercise machines, elevated track, and a variety of fitness classes. A student lounge, indoor swimming pool, spa, and 40-foot climbing wall was completed in 1999.

Swan Technical Center (1966) - This building contains many classrooms and laboratories designed specifically for engineering and engineering technology instruction. The building also contains offices of several College of Engineering Technology program coordinators and directors.

Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) (1967) (Renovated 2002) - As the official "welcome center" for the University, the Timme Center for Student Services (CSS) serves as a one-stop service center in which students can register for classes, obtain financial aid and housing information, request transcripts, pay bills, and inquire about student employment opportunities. Highlights of Timme CSS include a glass atrium that extends the full height of the eastern side of the building and a second atrium facing State Street, providing natural sunlight and openness for the building. Formerly the campus library, the Timme CSS is a place of diversity, art, history and service. The First Floor houses the Financial Aid, Business, and Student Employment offices; the offices of Admissions and Records, Enrollment Services, Academic Senate, & Institutional Research are on the Second Floor. The Third Floor features a display of Ferris historical memorabilia, as well as houses the offices of the President, Provost & Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Student Affairs, Chief Diversity Officer, Budgetary Planning and Analysis, and the Testing Office. The carefully chosen combination of offices and services provides a wonderful welcome to all constituents in the middle of campus.

Tot's Place (instituted 1987) - Located on the first floor of Bishop Hall, Tot's Place Child Development Center is a full service child care center providing educational programs for children of FSU students, faculty/staff, and the surrounding community. Tot's Place also serves as a laboratory for many FSU academic programs.

Victor F. Spathelf College of Allied Health Sciences (1979) - This four-level structure contains the specialized classrooms, laboratories and offices for the students, faculty and administration of the College of Allied Health Sciences.














Fall to Fall First-Year Student Retention Rates (Full-Time FTIACS)



Students Enrolled in 2 & 4 Yr Programs









Faculty-to-Administrator Ratio FY 2010






Instruction as a % of Total General Fund Spending FY 2010


Five Year Trend
