RICHARD SCOTT COHEN, MUSICAL DIRECTOR

Dr. Cohen is Associate Professor and Director of Instrumental Concert Ensembles at Ferris State University. He is director of the FSU West Central Concert Band, the FSU Symphony Band, the FSU Community Summer Band, and the FSU West Central Chamber Orchestra, and he also teaches classes in music appreciation. A native of Chicago, Cohen is a Phi Beta Kappa scholar from the University of Illinois, holds masters and doctorate degrees in conducting from Northwestern University, and is a former Fulbright Scholar to Spain. He is active as a conductor, trombonist, composer, arranger, music adjudicator, clinician, researcher, author, translator and lecturer throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Asia. Locally, he is a founding executive board member of the Festival of the Arts, serves on the board of Artworks, served on the Big Rapids Band Shell Development Committee, serves on the Big Rapids Band Shell Programming Committee, serves as advisor/collaborator to the Tuba Bach Chamber Music Festival, is a member of the Rotary Club of Big Rapids, and is Chairman of the Big Rapids Park and Recreation Board.

Remind me of my pain once again, with a burning sigh;

With a sigh that rains like fire over this cage,

Flightless nightingale, fly out from the corner of this cage.

Sing the song for the freedom of mankind.

With your breath, fill the cluttered mass

Of the battlefield of this earth with life and energy.

The ruthless oppression of the oppressor and the injustice of the hunters

Have left my nest dwindling in the wind.

God, universe, nature,

change our dark evening to a shiny dawn.

It's a new spring, the flowers have bloomed. The clouds in my eyes are filled with dew. This cage, like my heart, is stifled and dark.

Oh scorching sigh! Start a flame in this cage.

Mother Nature, don't cut short this flower of life.

Behold this tender flower.

Let it grow! Let it grow! Let it grow!

Your plight of separation, restless bird – Brief! Make it brief!

About the Poet

Mohammad-Taqí Bahār (1884-1951), widely known as Malek o-Sho'arā and Malek o-Sho'arā Bahār (literally: the king of poets), is a renowned Iranian poet and scholar, who was also a politician, journalist, historian and Professor of Literature. Although he was a 20th century poet, his poems are fairly traditional and strongly nationalistic in character.

Although Bahār worked for some period of time as a cleric, his first and foremost passions were writing (especially poetry), historical research, and teaching. His style of writing and the beauty of his poetry, in addition to his deep passion for Iran and his persistent opposition to fanaticism, have made him one of the greatest cultural icons of modern Iran.

About the Composer

Mortezá Neydávood was born in Tehrán, Irán in 1900 to a Jewish family with a musical heritage. He studied Persian classical music with Aghá Hosseingholli and Darvish Khán, and he performed for the Tehrán Radio station. In 1925 Neydávood opened his Darvish School of Music, named in honor of his deceased mentor. Iranians are familiar with many pieces composed by Neydávood, including "Morning Bird."

In 1980 at the age of 80, Neydávood immigrated with his family to the United States. It was a difficult time for him to be so far away from his country at that age. In 1984 he was awarded a certificate of honor from the mayor of Los Angeles. Mortezá Neydávood passed away on July 31, 1990, in San Francisco. He was laid to rest nearby at the Colmá Cemetery, thousands of miles away from his beloved country, Iran.
