

About Academic Service Learning

Academic service learning (ASL) is a method of instruction that allows students to connect – and thus, learn more deeply – concepts, skills, and other course content with needs and goals of community organizations and agencies. While making this connection, students learn from and provide meaningful service to the community organization or agency. Academic service-learning is a part of community and civic engagement. It can take place within a course, program, co-curriculum or student or professional organization under structured guidance.

To participate in the Academic Service Learning Program, the <u>following four elements</u> must be included in your specific ASL project and you must be willing to <u>share information about your ASL project with</u> the greater Ferris community at a poster presentation held near the end of the spring semester:

- 1. Address a community need that is identified by the community

 Faculty and individuals involved in professional academic organizations (i.e. RSOs), may partner with any number of community organizations or agencies, or seek assistance from Steering Committee members to identify community partners.
- 2. Orient and train students before engaging with the community
 Students should know about and engage with the organization or people with whom they will be working before starting the project. This helps develop mutual understanding and shared goals for the collaboration.
- **3.** Engage students in thoughtful and meaningful action
 After developing an appreciation and understanding of a community need, students directly address and support that need.
- 4. Allow students and involved faculty to reflect on their experiences

A hallmark of service learning pedagogy is reflecting on the experience. Students need the opportunity to reflect upon and process their learning, thereby making connections among prior knowledge, new knowledge, and their community service experiences. Example means for reflection include, but are not limited to, journals, essays, blogs, oral reports, speeches, group presentations, open discussion, and academic papers. Faculty should engage students in these discussions and engage community partners in reflection as well.

Ferris State University's Academic Service Learning Program Coordinators and Steering Committee, with support from Retention and Student Success, can provide assistance in the development of any aspect of your ASL project.
