We worked with our exchange students, who had come from our partner Universities abroad, to help them leave for their home countries. At the same time, we facilitated the return home to the US and continuation of studies for our domestic students studying abroad. We also worked with University stakeholders and various partners to coordinate efforts to ensure spring break study abroad students in Peru had a safe return home. During these efforts, we were supporting the needs of international students and addressing immediate challenges of housing, academic concerns, and life disruptions as we reconfigured our recruitment and admissions strategies and put in motion our business continuity plan to work remotely.
