Campus Internationalization 2.0

Greetings from the Office of International Education. Ten years ago, we started a conversation on campus about globalization and the challenges and opportunities it brings to our community. The work we have done as a university community has created a thriving global ecosystem and was recognized by the prestigious Institute of International Education this spring in New York City.

In my travels, I have come to appreciate how globalization, aided by the use of technology and trade, has influenced the reorganization of societies around the world. Globalization has helped to move more than a billion people out of poverty in a short period of time. At the same time, we have come to realize how digital technologies and automation have created disruptions and discourse that have amplified our differences. We are pushed to build walls and to seek solutions that divide us.

We need to go beyond embracing diversity to advocating for inclusion in order to build a cohesive community of learners who are prepared for our global economy and society. The Global Competency Collaborative Certificate (GCC) Program: A Global Approach

Campus Internationalization 2.0 at Ferris will require intense focus on internationalization to foster excellence in localization, meaning our campus and students must develop abilities to navigate globally and influence locally. With the support of the Provost's Office, the OIE has embarked on an ambitious project to build a new co-curricular certificate called the Global Competency Collaborative (GCC) Certificate. This program is designed to be a vehicle that connects and synergizes our local and global resources to prepare our students for a global economy and society. Faculty, staff, and community partners play active roles in supporting the program and our students.

The GCC Certificate program was designed to connect local and global partnerships to create a robust sustainable ecosystem that expands awareness, engagement, and networking. By completing this three-year program, students will have acquired global knowledge, skills, and abilities that prepare them to succeed professionally in a global economy and self-actualize in a global society. The approach is to focus on building 21st century skills through co-curricular engagements that complement the general education curriculum and major coursework, bringing all of the elements and resources together to prepare our students for our global economy and society.

By collaborating with industry and community partners, the program connects students to potential future employers interested in helping them leverage their network to support their future plans.

Program participants will gain global competency through co-curricular engagements and selected academic experiences, including study abroad and internships. However, in order to take full advantage of the study abroad and internship opportunities, students require systematic development of knowledge, skills, and abilities over time. The three-year program incorporates the following five components to help students enhance their understanding of the global landscape, develop global skills, and strengthen their ability to navigate complex environments.

- **1. Mentorship**, beginning with academic mentorship by faculty with global experience moving to career mentorship by professionals from globally connected industry partners and organizations
- **2. Learning**, focusing on developing global awareness and knowledge through targeted coursework and learning engagements
- **3. Engagement**, involving guided interactions with multicultural communities on campus, in West Michigan, and around the world and deliberative dialogues on difficult topics in multicultural groups
- **4. Experiential Learning**, participating in high impact study abroad programs and globally centered internship opportunities
- **5. Assessment**, measuring progress in the development of global knowledge, skills, and abilities, resulting in global competency

The first cohort of 17 students began in the fall 2018 semester, and a new cohort will start each fall with up to 40 students. Through this cohort model designed to foster the development of global competency over a three-year period, our students will be prepared to succeed in a global economy and society and help strengthen an inclusive global ecosystem on our campus.
