

Station 1: Case History



Once they were in, a personal medical history was taken on everyone. Here, Trish checks the blood pressure on a patient.

Station 2: Visual Acuities





Distance and near visual acuities were performed on everyone. Much of the work done in the clinic was performed by Guyanese nationals from the Association of Bible Churches.

Station 2



Terry was the Station 2 coordinator and here is seen preparing to instill drops. To protect from the sun while dilated all patients received disposable sunglasses.

Station 3: Autorefraction/Triage



The first step at Station 3 was the autorefraction (a measurement of the approximate glasses power needed). Dawn is using one of the autorefractors here.



Julie reviewed each person's exam form. She did a brief examination on everyone who had good vision with no disease.

Station 4: Examination



If the person had poor vision, diabetes, glaucoma or other problems they moved to Station 4. Two of the doctors, here Jeff B. and Dave, did examinations on them to verify a glasses prescription from the autorefraction and to evaluate ocular health.

Patient Flow



Amanda helped direct traffic from Station 2 to Stations 3 and 4 (upstairs) and back down to Stations 5 through 7.

Station 5: Detailed Examination



If there was a need for a more detailed exam they went to Station 5, where we had more specialized equipment. Dave is using an instrument to look at the periphery of the inside of the eye. We used the phoropter (seen above the lady's head) for those with complicated glasses prescriptions.

Station 5: Detailed Examination



Jeff P. is seen here using a special microscope to get a better look at this lady's eyes. We were able to refer about 65 people for surgery to a team of ophthalmologists that followed us.



Jeff G. sorts through the 6,500 pairs of donated glasses for a match for a patient. We also brought 2,250 pairs of readers.



Thankfully, Jaime and Mitch could sort through a computer database to get the closest matches to each person's prescription.




