Haitian Lifestyle

- Haiti is home to 12 million people.
- It is slightly larger than the state of Maryland
- The main language is Creole, which is similar to French.
- Only 30% of Haitians are functionally literate.
- Average annual income is \$310.

Ann is doing retinoscopy on one of the patients. This helps determine a prescription for glasses that the patient may need.




Dr. Miller is in the middle of a sea of people waiting to get their glasses.

Hopital Lumiere




- In English, this is known as the Hospital of Light.

Mimi is trying to explain that she needs to check his vision and see how well he can see far away.




Meredith is checking this patient's near vision so that we would know what reading glasses to give him.

With the help of a translator, Dr. Brian Hamann is explaining his diagnosis to one of his patients.






Maribeth and Dr. Hamann saw the patients that we thought had a problem that needed more than a pair of glasses to fix.




- Andy used a catalog of the glasses to quickly find a prescription that would work for the patient.

- He also helped to fix some of the trucks at the hospital.







In addition to adjusting glasses in the dispensary, Pastor Gary gave several presentations at churches in the local communities.
