## The Group



Our team consisted of 16 people with amazing hearts to serve the Lord. We had 2 optometrists, 2 ophthalmologists, 6 MCO optometry students, a wife of one of the optometrists, a husband of a student, and 4 Village church members including a Mission Pastor, optician, and nurse.

While this was just our team that was part of the Mission group, we had many individuals from Ukraine who were critical members. These included numerous translators, volunteers, local pastors, Ukrainian ophthalmologists, and so many more!!



## The Vision

Our goal was to serve members of the Ukrainian community through vision care and sharing the gospel. Our partnership with Mission Eurasia, a Christian missions group based in eastern Europe, transformed these hopes into realities. Without the help of these wonderful people, we would not have been able to accomplish all that we did.

#### **Obstacles**

Immediately upon entering Ukraine we were faced with unforeseen challenges:

- All of our equipment was detained by Ukrainian customs. Despite the tireless efforts of our Mission Eurasia team, the equipment remained in customs for the week.

- One of our ophthalmologists, Dr. Nasser, had planned to perform strabismus surgeries. However, there was not a Ukrainian surgeon available whose license Dr. Nasser could operate under. As a result, no strabismus surgeries took place.

## The Bible College





The Bible College was where we stayed while in Korosten, ate breakfast & dinner, and where we were able to socialize after the clinic day was over. On the Sunday while we were there, we attended a church service that was on the second story of this building... so we didn't have to walk far.



## Clinic

Our clinic was composed of multiple successive stations, each one building more of the patient's information until they would see the doctors in an examination lane. Despite not having our equipment, over the 5 days of clinic we were able to see 975 patients!
